Refugee Assistance

Our church has recently become involved with assisting refugee families of war who have been resettled in our area. Catholic Social Services has connected the FPCCS POWR (Parishes Organized to Welcome Refugees) team to a family from the Democratic Republic of Congo.



This family consists of a thirty-four-year-old widow and her six children ages ranging between five and seventeen. They have recently been informed that they will be evicted from their home within thirty days because the landlord wants to make improvements to the property.

Thus, there is an immediate need for low-income housing in Scranton. There are also pressing needs for better work and driving lessons. In addition, another refugee family whom we've become friends with needs a very inexpensive functioning car.
