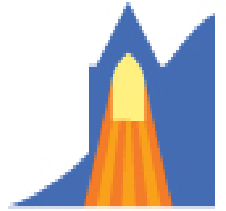

Worship Services

Holy Week worship services scheduled

Strengthen your faith through attending worship

We begin Holy Week with **Palm Sunday on April 13**. We will have **two worship services** that day, at **8:30 a.m.** and **10:00 a.m.** Take note of the special times! We will distribute palms at both services, and the adult choir will sing Faure's familiar anthem "The Palms." Palm Sunday is also the day when we begin our weekly **Joyful Noise** program for children during the 10:00 a.m. service.

On **Wednesday, April 16**, we will celebrate a church-wide **Passover Seder at 5:45 p.m.** A light supper will be served, and we will commemorate God's liberation of the Jews from Egyptian slavery. This is our Holy Week WAY program. Reservations are needed, and can be made by calling the church office or e-mailing office@fpccs.org.

Maundy Thursday is April 17. We will worship that night in the shadows, celebrating the Lord's Supper together and taking part in a Tenebrae ("Shadows") service at **7:30 p.m.** This meaningful evening is a favorite for many!

On **Good Friday, April 18**, we will have a one-hour worship service in our sanctuary at 12:00 noon. Local clergy will be invited to join us if they are available. The centerpiece of the service is a congregational reading of the Passion story from the Gospel of John. If you would like to have a speaking part, contact Rev. Carter at pastor@fpccs.org.

Easter Sunday is April 20. As with Palm Sunday, we will have **two worship services** that day, at 8:30 a.m. and 10:00 a.m. Join us for this festive celebration of Christ's resurrection, with the Lord's Supper served at both services.

From the Pastor

William G. Carter

Dear Friends,

My first experience of a Tenebrae Service came through my home church's youth leader. She had begun to take courses at a seminary and told us, "There's this really cool service in Holy Week where people sit in the dark." None of our well-starched Presbyterians could imagine this, of course. They were daylight people. They preferred to worship where they could look around and see what other people were doing.

We assembled out of curiosity. The candelabra had been taken out of the church attic and polished. Readers had been assigned scripture passages and coached on words like "Gethsemane." A responsible adult stood near the light panel with an annotated crib sheet. And we worshiped in the shadows that night.

It seemed so appropriate. Scripture wasn't merely the diving board for the sermon. It was the script for the entire service. We were welcomed, quite literally, into the Upper Room, as Jesus convened his disciples, instituted his Supper around their Seder table, and the words and events surrounding his arrest and trial were shared. I recall it was the first time that I ever felt like my life was part of the Bible's story.

That's why Christians have done such things. It is not mere play-acting, but a means of enrolling in God's greater story. The Jews have celebrated the Passover this way for thousands of years. In fact, the actual Passover story is told in the book of Exodus as if it is annual engagement with the story of their saving from slavery. The ancient tale is brought forward in time. It is owned by those first purchased by God. Every generation declares, "We were slaves in Egypt, and God brought us out..." Historically, there is a gap between then and now. But in the deepest possible way, it is spiritually true.

In the same way, Jesus took the bread and the cup. He blessed them, broke the bread, poured out the cup, and shared these gifts with those whom he loved. He still does this. In the process, we move from Last Supper to Lord's Supper, recalling the original meal as we affirm his risen presence with us. We are enrolled in that great story of salvation, brought out of our slavery to sin and death, and liberated to join Christ in his continuing work in world and church. "Were you there when they crucified my Lord?" Historically, no, I was not. But in the deepest possible way, yes, I was. And I was there when God raised him from the dead.

"The Christian faith is an act of memory," taught my teacher Fred Craddock. He does not mean that in a spooky sense. Nor does he affirm that we should fake our memory of events that happened before we were born. To remember is to participate. It is to "take part," to join in, to continue what saved God's people so long ago. Memory is an exercise of faith, an imaginative involvement in the true work of God's saving.

So we move toward Palm Sunday, wave the palm branches, and shout hosanna. We gather around the Seder table, then the Lord's Table, and affirm the holy meals that declare freedom and grace. We stand on Golgotha on Good Friday, and remember how human cruelty and wretchedness nailed God's Son to a cross. We sing our surprise on Easter, for God is not captive to our sin and death, but raised the Christ to free us as well. I wish you the holiest of Holy Weeks, and commend to you the deep mercy of Jesus Christ.

ALL CHURCH SEDER - Wednesday, April 16, 5:45-7:15pm. The Passover Seder is a time for us to celebrate how God freed the Israelites from Egyptian slavery. This meal also prepares us for the events of Holy Week because the Seder was the last meal Jesus shared with his disciples before his arrest, death and resurrection. The evening begins at 5:45pm. Light supper will be served during the program. Since this is planned as a family event, we ask that young children be accompanied by a parent or guardian. **Please make reservations by Monday, April 14.**

Spark (Newborns - 3 year olds) will enjoy Bible stories, songs and games in the nursery with teacher Linda Schuller and our caregivers Kaitlin Scappatura and Sondra Lionetti.

Power Xpress (4 year old - Grade 6) are divided into three age groups. **April 2 and 9:** *Symbols of Holy Week.* Using symbols to tell the story of Holy Week can help us better understand and tell others the story of the last days of Jesus' life. **April 23, 30 and May 7:** *Easter: Peter's Story.* The Easter story tells us that Jesus loved Peter, forgave Peter for denying him and asked Peter to care for God's children. The story also tells us that Jesus loves us, forgives us and asks us to care for others.

Junior/Senior High (Grades 7-12) meets in room 111 with Jana Schillinger and Charlie Pinches. This spring our youth will be digging deeper into some well-known Bible stories.

Talking About God Stuff (TAGS) - meets in room 206. **April 2 and 9.** *Chocolate for Lent.* Led by Rev. Carter. Using themes from the 2000 Academy Award Nominated film *Chocolat*, this unique approach to the season of Lent creates the space for deeper insights into self-discipline, self-giving, conversation, acceptance and maturing in Christ. Join us as we delve into the delicious depths of humanity. **April 23** begins a six week series called "**Body and Soul: What Do We Believe?**" with Rev. Carter. We will explore these questions of faith: Who am I? What's wrong with the world? What's the purpose of my life? Why should I follow Jesus? How can I grow close to God?

Faith and Life - meets in room 210. **April 2 and 9.** *Discovering Your Spiritual Gifts.* Led by Judy Cutler and Robin Pinches. During the season of Lent, this class will be looking at who God has created us to be and how he has created us for these purposes by discovering the many spiritual gifts that he has given to us. As our gifts become revealed to us, we begin to see how we can be used by God to further His kingdom here on earth. **April 23 and 30** *Teach Us To Pray.* John Conklin and Judy Cutler. Prayer is a vital part of Christian life but, at times, the tasks of praying with others and praying for others can feel daunting. In this two week series, our Stephen Ministers will help us to develop skills that allow us to feel more comfortable when praying with and for other people.

For the 3rd Year we will be ordering Eco-Palms- Why Order Eco-Palms?

Eco-Palms preserve the vitality of the communities and forests for years to come. Community groups receive 5 to 6 times the payment per frond as they would from conventional palms. Eco-Palms are purchased directly from the producers, which lessens the impact of market fluctuations on the price they receive. The supply chain of Eco-Palms allows value-added processing to take place within the community. Typically Eco-Palms are harvested in the forest by men and processed by women, which increases employment opportunities for women in the community and helps them contribute to their family's financial stability.

Ensuring a market for the palms protects the forests from clear cutting and being converted to agricultural fields. Your Eco-Palms purchase helps improve standards of living and protect forests.

Table Talk on the River Corridor- Sunday, April 6th

Bernie McGurl, Director of the Lackawanna River Corridor Association will talk about the restoration of the Lackawanna River Corridor. The Lackawanna River Corridor Association (LRCA) was created by local citizens in 1987 to promote the restoration and conservation of the Lackawanna River and its watershed resources in the great Northeast Pennsylvania. Since 1987, the LRCA has worked pro-actively with other community groups and public agencies to plan and promote projects which are addressing the issues of water pollution, recreation, community development, land and water conservation, public involvement with their river and watershed, and the public policy decision making which affects the river and watershed. WE CAN ALL RECYCLE

As part of our Green Church initiative, the Earth Care Task Force asks you to please recycle at church as well as at home. There are recycle bins in the kitchen where you may place clean, recyclable items. From the Clarks Summit Borough website: ALL PLASTICS WITH A RECYCLING SYMBOL #1-7, ALMOST ANY PAPER PRODUCT, INCLUDING JUNK MAIL, MAGAZINES, OFFICE-GRADE PAPER, NEWSPAPERS, CORRUGATED CARDBOARD AND FOOD BOXES CAN BE RECYCLED TOGETHER!

CFL's (the new curly queue bulb) must be recycled. Now that most incandescent bulbs have been replaced by Compact Fluorescent Lights, how do you dispose of them when they burn out? CFL's should never go in the garbage and must be recycled. We encourage you to bring CFL's from home and dispose of them in the gray barrel next to the stove in the kitchen. Please be careful to not break the CFL's.

May Haiti Trip:

From May 19 to June 1, five delegates including photographer Pat Henneforth and graphic designer David Porter of FPCCS, Stacey Trunk of Tunkhannock Presbyterian Church, and videographers Justin Kraky and Cassidy Evans will be traveling to Haiti to document the musical works, lives, community services, and hopes for Haiti through the band 2 Rasin [meaning Two Roots in Haitian Kreyol]. The hope is to produce a high quality documentary about these band members that can be distributed as a tool for speakers bureaus nationwide advocating for the people of Haiti. Much of the documentary will include representation of programs we have supported through Groundswell International and NaSonje including Women’s Micro-finance programs, awareness and solutions for violence against women and children, education efforts including our support for Pastor Ciceron and his school, sustaining the environment, and more.... We will probably end the visit with a concert on a beach in Jacmel.

Friends of the Earth: Original Sculptures Made from Recycled Plastic Caps!

In conjunction with Clarks Summit Borough, members of the Abington Business and Professional Association are invited to participate in a new ‘members only’ value-added event, Friends of the Earth: Original Sculptures Made from Recycled Plastic Caps.

Under the direction of Diana Lombardi from the Abington Art Studio, two-dimensional treated plywood sculptures adorned with plastic caps will be available for purchase, first come, first served, to be put on display the weekend of April 25-27, 2014. The size of each will be approximately 4’x4’. Sculptures will be created at a hands-on workshop to be held at the Abington Community Library April 4-5. You may either hang your sculpture in your business window or choose a free-standing sculpture (base provided). Cost: \$100.00.

Due to time restrictions, only a limited number of sculptures will be created this year; orders that cannot be filled will have their payments refunded. The original participating business will keep and store their sculptures and we will add to the excitement to the event in coming years with additional sculptures.

Other events occurring that weekend in the Summit will include electronics recycling and a used book sale. We hope you will consider opening your business that weekend and offering your own *green* or recycling opportunities.

We will be discussing: **Behind the Beautiful Forevers** – Katherine Boo

While the distance between rich and poor is growing in the U.S., the gap between the haves and have-nots in India is staggering to behold. This first book by a New Yorker staff writer (and Pulitzer Prize-winning reporter for the Washington Post) jolts the reader's consciousness with the opposing realities of poverty and wealth in a searing visit to the Annawaldi settlement, a flimflam slum that has recently sprung up in the western suburbs of the gigantic city of Mumbai, perched tentatively along the modern highway leading to the airport and almost within a stone's throw of new, luxurious hotels. We first meet Abdul, whose daily grind is to collect trash and sell it; in doing so, he has "lifted his large family above subsistence." Boo takes us all around the community, introducing us to a slew of disadvantaged individuals who, nevertheless, draw on their inner strength to not only face the dreary day but also ponder a day to come that will, perhaps, be a little brighter.



WHAT IS STEPHEN MINISTRY?

Stephen Ministry is a way congregations can provide high-quality care and outreach to hurting people in the congregation and community.

Stephen Ministers are congregation members who have gone through 50 hours of training to provide one-to-one, Christ-centered care. Each Stephen Minister is matched with a hurting person—men are paired with men, women with women—and meets weekly with that person to listen, care, pray, and encourage.

Stephen Ministers care for those dealing with grief, divorce, job loss, hospitalization, financial struggles, loneliness, convalescence, terminal illness, and many other life difficulties.

If you are interested in the Stephen Ministry program, you can find many stories from people who received help from a Stephen Minister or are Stephen Ministers themselves on the Stephen Ministry web site. Easter Cake

Celebrate our risen Lord with this uniquely decorated cake.



What you need:

- Adult help
- Box of cake mix (any flavor)
- Tub of brown frosting
- Shredded coconut
- Green food coloring
- Chocolate Hostess Ding Dong cupcake
- Donut hole
- Pretzel sticks
- M&M's candies

What you do:

1. Bake cake in rectangular pan. When cool, frost it.
2. Pour coconut into bowl. Add drops of green food coloring. Mix until coconut resembles grass.
3. In one corner of cake, set Ding Dong upright to resemble a tomb. Place donut hole in front of it, to one side.
4. Make three crosses with six pretzel sticks and some frosting. Arrange on opposite corner from tomb.
5. Use brown M&M's to make a path from the crosses to the tomb.
6. Use other colors of M&M's to spell out "Jesus lives!"

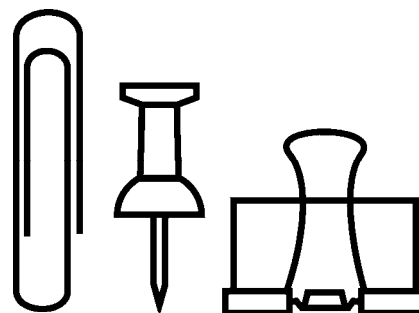
