### From the Pastor

This month, I want to introduce you to Frank Jones, the newest member of our staff. There are a lot of things about him that are impressive. He's an Eagle scout who serves on the summer staff of Goose Pond camp. He teaches children to sing in four elementary schools in the Scranton public school system. Frank directs the "Camerata" choir of teenage men for the Choral Society youth program. And as you might expect, he has an extraordinary singing voice.

In the tradition of a local newspaper, we asked Frank five quick questions to introduce him to you. Here are "Five with Frank."

#### a. How did you fall in love with singing?

I first fell in love with singing when I was in elementary school at Holy Rosary School in Scranton. I began singing for our parish as a cantor then joined the Choral Society of NEPA within a couple of months. After that, it was something that I began to really feel good about and tried to become the best that I could be at it. I originally thought that I wanted to be an environmental engineer, but those thoughts were quickly dismissed. Could you imagine me being an environmental engineer?!

#### b. Why is singing so important for worship?

Music is important for worship because there are certain things that happen when music and worship combine. We can sing praises and emphasize what is being said through scripture, but we're allowed to craft and bring those texts to life. It allows the listener to really interpret what is happening.

#### c. Do you come from a musical family?

I do come from a musical family. My father learned to play the drums from ear and has played ever since. I vividly remember coming home one day from work and my father was jamming out to Maroon 5. I thought it was kind of funny, but he can put on any music and just play. In addition, my grandmother was a fabulous pianist.

#### d. What are three things you enjoy doing?

I really enjoy doing outdoor activities like camping, hiking and kayaking. I'm very involved with the Boy Scouts through working at scout camps, visitations of camps and training leaders for summer camps. Lastly, I never mind turning on a good movie.

#### e. What are your hopes and dreams for First Presbyterian Church?

I'm really hopeful for the position that I'm in. I've enjoyed working with the members of the church. I want as many people to come and sing with us as possible. If you could only make it for a day or want to be a permanent fixture in the choir, I want to extend the welcome to help make music for the church!

I hope you join me in making Frank feel welcome! See you on Sunday.

We will be meeting on Oct 22, 2015 at Char Lyon's home at 7:00. If you would like to car pool, meet in the upper church parking lot at 6:40. We will be discussing The Spool of Blue Thread by Anne Tyler It's pretty clear that Anne Tyler is comfortable with the art of storytelling. From the first lines of A Spool of Blue Thread, there's an urge to sit back and settle into the cadence of her words. Or, rather, Abby Whitshank's words as she recounts the story of how she fell in love with Red Whitshank in 1959. But don't get too comfortable. Anne Tyler understands that, despite their best intentions, family members don't often let each other settle back for very long-and the Whitshanks, a Baltimore clan whose history is told through several generations in this sensitive and empathetic novel. is no different than most. As Abby and Red age, their children are drawn back to their sprawling house. When the second part of the novel moves back in time, the shift is jarring at first; but after a fifty year writing career (this is her 20th novel), Tyler has the end in sight. This is a book about the stories we tell each other and the little moments that make up our lives.




The Arts at First Presbyterian concert series will open with the Terrace Piano Quartet on Sunday, October 25 at 4 pm. The Terrace Piano Quartet is an ensemble of young musicians with sterling resumes and a variety of national and international exposure. The group consists of John Michael Vaida on violin, Amy Iwazumi on viola. Miho Zaitsu on cello, and Hwaen Ch'uqi on the piano. Vaida and Ch'uqi are graduates of the esteemed Eastman School of Music, while Iwazumi has degrees from The Julliard School. John Michael Vaida is Adjunct Professor and directs the Chamber Orchestra at Wilkes University. He also serves as Artist-in-Residence at Wyoming Seminary, where he coaches chamber music and maintains a vibrant private studio. Hwaen Ch'uqi quickly distinguished himself as one of the rare pianists to be invited three times as a fellow to the prestigious Tanglewood

Music Center; there, he studied with such luminaries as Gilbert Kalish and Leon Fleisher. Having given solo and ensemble performances to critical acclaim in over a dozen countries across five continents, Amy Iwazumi enjoys a diverse career as a musician and web/graphic designer, founding Amy I Productions. Cellist Miho Zaitsu continues to excite audiences with her thoughtprovoking performances throughout the United States, Europe, and Asia. They will be performing the Faure Piano Quartet No. 1 and the Brahms Piano Quartet No. 3 at this concert.

This event is open to the public, free of charge, but a free-will offering will be taken to help defray our costs. We receive some financial support from state and county grants, but rely heavily on the support of individual donors to produce the series.



**Spark (Newborn - 3 year old)** enjoy Bible stories, songs and games in the nursery. Stories this month are Isaac's Blessing (Genesis 25:19-34; 27:1-40), Free From Slavery (Exodus 5:1-6:13), The Red Sea (Exodus 14:1-30), and the Ten Commandments (Exodus 20:1-17).

**Power Xpress (4 year old - Grade 5)** Are divided into two ages groups and experience Bible stories through interactive rotation classes. Our year continues with Out of Egypt (Exodus 2-14) and Samuel (1 Samuel 1:9-27; 3:1-20).

We Believe: With All Boldness and Freedom (Grades 6-8) Room 209 with Jana Schillinger and Dick Cochrane. This year students will work through the New Testament to gain the overall picture of the life of Jesus and the early church. In October, this class looks at Jesus' Childhood (Luke 2:21-38; Matthew 2:19-23), Jesus' Baptism and Temptation (Isaiah 40:3-4; Mark 1:9-13; Matthew 3-4), The Reign of God (Luke 4:14-30; Mark 1:5, 9) and Assembling Disciples (Luke 5:1-32; John 1:43-51; Mark 10:46-52).

**PresbyYouth: Prophetic Calls For Justice (Grades 9-12; college age adults)** Room 111. This course looks at the prophets' words of judgment and hope and their relevance to today's world. October's lessons include Micah (Micah 6:6-8), The Exile (Psalm 137; 146; 149; Jeremiah 29), Ezekiel (Ezekiel 1-3; 8-11; 37) and Joel (Joel 1-3).

**Talking About God Stuff (T.A.G.S.)** Room 206. October 7: *Banned: Questions About The Bible*. October 14-November 18: *Esther*. Esther's story shows God's deliverance and care for His people amid risky twists turns, happy and fearful moments and dangerous and deadly outcomes. As we venture through the book of Esther, we are reminded that God keeps His age-old promises even in today's world.

**Faith and Life** Room 210. October 7: *In The News: Marriage*. October 14-November 18: *Life Together*. Living together as a church family requires us to care for and tend to those among us who are in need. In the first two weeks of this class, our Stephen Ministers share what it means for them to care for us as a congregation and how they have been blessed by this ministry.

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# **MISSION AND JUSTICE**



In the Presbyterian Calendar, September 6 begins the **Season of Peace**. The Season includes the 9/11 remembrance, the UN designated International Day of Peace on September 21, Native American Day on the 22<sup>nd</sup>, and the Global Week of Action Against Gun Violence beginning on September 24.

During this time we ponder the events in the world where injustice, intolerance, and violence affect so many people. What can we do? We can pray, be intentional in our own lives toward peace, and we can give generously to the Peace and Global Witness Offering. 25% of the money we collect will be given to the Catherine McAuley Center in Scranton, which is a support system, a lifeline, and a bridge to self-reliance for homeless women and families in Lackawanna and Luzerne Counties. You can read their Mission Statement on the Mission and Justice bulletin board in the narthex. 25% of the offering will be used within our Presbytery and Synod, while 50 % will be used by the Presbyterian Mission Agency to promote peace around the world.

**The Season** concludes on October 4, World Communion Sunday, when we will receive the Peace and Global Witness Offering.


Make these practical gifts to share blessings with homeless people and others in need.
