#### Sunday, December 13 Christmas Caroling at 11:00 a.m.



#### From the Pastor

William G. Carter

#### Dear Friends,

#### I found a bit of recycled verse in a drawer and decided to share it as we prepare for Christmas:

Christmas is told for children, we know. In pageants, we dress up like Mary and Joe, With shepherds and wise ones and some friendly beasts We tell of the star that arose in the East. The kids will lean forward and watch with big eyes. This night is for them, and that's no surprise. They hear about how the great God above Came down as a Child to express the love That is now extended to saint and to sinner, To rich and to poor, to loser and winner. The young ones peer over the top of the manger And see there a Child who is not a stranger. He looks just like them, yet with hay as his throne. Some children see Jesus as one of their own. Should children be absent from our lives tonight, The mystery and wonder may dwindle from sight. So I wish for us all, in the Word for this day, To listen for what the scriptures might say.

It's true there's a Child at the heart of the story, An Infant who shows us the size of God's glory. In three chapters (seven, eleven, and nine), Isaiah reveals what the Lord has in mind: A child shall come as a gift from our God. The mighty scratch heads, and think this is odd. For how can it be that power be weak? Or that God's Messiah would appear guite so meek? Authority on shoulders? Now, that would be swell! But God is more subtle, far as we can tell. According to Luke, the new Savior is found Among peasants, not kings; and this does confound. The message? Humility, and service to all. Instead of great glory, we need to be small. And rather than inflate a sense of our power, We look to the God in our manger this hour. This isn't a message for children alone Who look upon Jesus as one of their own.

One day, when approached by grumpy adults, Christ spoke a Word that can create new results. "Grow up and become like a child," he said. Give up your pretensions – get that in your head. Not childish, with tantrums to get your own way, But child-like, believing that God has some say About how you live, and whom you should love. To be such a child is the way from above. You cannot see God and his kingdom, we're told, If faith calcifies or love grows stone-cold. In time, we shall all become young once again, So this is our practice for what lies ahead: Depend on a strength that is greater than yours, Stay humble and trusting, and one with the poor. If there are no children in your life this night, Become one - - and trust in the power of Light To brighten all darkness, to shine forth God's glory. This is the purpose of our ancient story.

God's children see Jesus as one of their own. He's not big and strong, nor leaves us alone. He's not distant, hidden by clouds far away, But right here among us. And here he will stay. The ones who receive him, in midst of their strife, Shall know of God's mercy in all of their life. So open your soul and let Jesus in. If your heart is too small, or your brain is too thin, Get involved in his work and become like a child: Console the afflicted, the meek, and the mild. Speak justice, tell truth, and the homeless invite, Go find all the lost. In darkness, shine light. Forgive and be fair. In all things, show love. For Christ is the gift we've received from above. The wolf and the lamb live together in peace. The calf lies by lion whose hunger has ceased. A vision of mercy is proclaimed this day, And it happens because the Child leads the way.

We are taking a break in December for the holidays but will pick up again in January. Come join us

on Jan 28, 2016 at Judy Cutler's home. We will be discussing All the Light We Cannot See by Anthony Doerr Does the world need yet another novel about WWII? It does when the novel is as inventive and beautiful as this one by Anthony Doerr. In fact, All the Light We Cannot See--while set mostly in Germany and France before and during the war--is not really a "war novel". Yes, there is fear and fighting and disappearance and death, but the author's focus is on the interior lives of his two characters. Marie Laure is a blind, 14year-old French girl who flees to the countryside when her father disappears from Nazi-occupied Paris. Werner is a gadget-obsessed German orphan whose skills admit him to a brutal branch of Hitler Youth. Never mind that their paths don't cross until very late in the novel, this is not a book you read for plot (although there is a wonderful, mysterious subplot about a stolen gem). This is a book you read for the beauty of Doerr's writing--"Abyss in her gut, desert in her throat, Marie-Laure takes one of the cans of food..."--and for the way he understands and cherishes the magical obsessions of childhood. Marie Laure and Werner are never quaint or twee. Instead they are powerful examples of the way average people in trying times must decide daily between morality and survival.





# BETHLEHEM


Make a mobile to remind you of Jesus' birth.

#### What you need:

- Paper plate
- Hole punch
- Thin blue ribbon
- Scissors
- Pencil
- Yellow craft foam
- Marker

#### What you do:

- 1. With the paper plate upside down, punch evenly spaced holes along the rim. Gently fold the plate and punch a hole in the center.
- 2. Cut pieces of ribbon, thread them through the holes as desired and tie the ribbons securely.
- 3. Trace several small stars and one larger star on the foam and cut them out. Punch a hole atop a point of each star.
- 4. Tie one small star to each outer-rim ribbon.
- 5. Thread a longer ribbon through the center hole and tie the large star to the other end.
- 6. Write a verse on the plate or large star. Hang the mobile from the ceiling with another piece of blue ribbon.
