
Join us for worship on Christmas Eve

From the Pastor

From the Pastor December 2017

"In those days a decree went out from Emperor Augustus that all the world should be registered." (Luke 2:1)

Our Christmas story begins with a political decree. That's a striking detail, often overlooked in our rush to move to the manger. Far from the region of Judea, a pagan politician ordered a census. The purpose was not to fix gerrymandered districts nor to distribute funds to those in greater need. Rather it was to expand the tax system, probably to help finance the billeting of Roman soldiers that occupied Judea.

Some scholars believe that peasants and artisans (like the carpenter Joseph) had as much as half of their income consumed by Roman taxes. These taxes were imposed without representation, collected by local collaborators with the empire, and enforced by the sword. It's hard to imagine this. The closest analogy to my experience is the imperial oppression depicted in the first couple of Star Wars movies; even that is difficult to fathom in real life.

Yet this was the situation under which Jesus was born. Throughout the Mediterranean world there was a cruel tyrant, an oppressive regime, a system of unfairness and cruelty, all run by violence. . . "and unto us a child is born, a son is given."

In telling the birth of Jesus, Luke does not directly criticize the empire. If Caesar's minions had noticed that, they would have smacked him down. But the account of our savior's birth gives a clear alternative to the way the world worked - and still works. It is the way of humility, the humility of God.

As the British cleric J. B. Phillips wrote,

"It is fifteen hundred years ago that this apparently invincible Empire utterly collapsed, and all that is left of it is ruins. Yet the little baby, born in such pitiful humility and cut down as a young man in his prime, commands the allegiance of millions of people all over the world. Although they have never seen him, he has become friend and companion to innumerable people. This undeniable fact is, by any measurement, the most astonishing phenomenon of human history. It is a solid rock of evidence that no agnostic can ever explain away." ("The Dangers of Advent")

What we celebrate in December is a world-shaking truth: that God has come and been found among us. His birth, life, death, and resurrection still offer an alternative to the brutal ways of the world. Jesus offers salvation - a saving from ourselves - and blessed are those who become as humble as he.







PRESBYTERIAN WOMEN CIRCLE BIBLE STUDIES

Share the good news of Jesus' birth with this creative Christmas card.

What you need:

- Construction paper (two pieces, including one white)
- Pencil
- Scissors
- Pens
- Glue stick



What you do:

- 1. Neatly fold the white paper in half, short side to short side.
- 2. Draw two parallel lines (at least 2 inches apart) from the fold to about halfway to the edge. Cut along the lines.
- 3. Fold the cut section back and forth so it pops up.
- 4. Push the section up so it pops up inside the folded paper. Draw a nativity scene on the pop-up box.
- 5. Fold the colored paper in half, short side to short side. Place the white paper inside it and glue the white paper down, being careful not to glue the pop-up box.
- 6. Write a Christmas message and give or send the card to someone.

Through the interaction with the energetic volunteer coordinator, Rich Piccolotti, the group was able to learn a great deal about the food bank facility and its ongoing operation. Due to the positive response of our church's participation, an additional volunteer day was organized on November 12th at another Weinberg Food Bank facility in Wilkes-Barre. Seventeen members of our church participated in the assembly and distribution of Thanksgiving food items. Approximately 1500 families received food on the day we volunteered.
