**Sunday, March 29 at 8:30 and 10:00 a.m.** - Palm Sunday celebration, marking the beginning of Holy Week.


Maundy Thursday, April 2 at 7:30 p.m. - A service of Holy Communion and Tenebrae, marking the Last Supper with Jesus

#### From the Pastor

Fifty years ago this month, the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr. and his colleagues led three voter registration marches from Selma, Alabama. They were based on the biblical truth that all people are created in the image of God, a truth that is still challenged by racism and intolerance.

The first march was stopped at the Edmund Pettus Bridge, a Selma structure named after a Confederate general and Grand Dragon of the Ku Klux Klan. On March 7, 1965, six hundred American citizens began a march to Montgomery over that bridge to protest their systematic exclusion from the voting booth. Because their skin was black, they were stopped by Sheriff Joe Clark and a brutal deputized posse. They were beaten on national television. The event was called "Bloody Sunday," and may have been the singular event that drew compassionate bystanders into the struggle for equal rights.

I walked that bridge on February 8 of this year. During a quick trip to that region, there was a brief window of time, so I drove to Selma as a personal pilgrimage. The drive from Montgomery was haunting. Beginning from a downtown "warehouse" where African slaves had once been kept and sold, I traveled through miles of former plantations. I read historical markers where the civil rights marchers camped during the third and largest march. I paused to pray where a white woman was murdered by four KKK members, one of them an informant for the FBI.



Parking at the foot of the bridge, I stood for a moment before monuments remembering those killed in the struggle for civil rights. Then I walked in Dr. King's footsteps, praying, "Lord, have mercy" with every pace. It was one of the most moving moments of my life.

It was good preparation for Lent, the season in which we find ourselves. As a person whose skin color has provided many privileges, I have also lived with many blind spots. I have rarely paid attention when others were forced to wait in lines while I was whisked through. I have been silent while others have been mistreated. I have not stood with those who continue to be excluded because of how God created them. Lord, have mercy.

As a nation, we will certainly revisit the events of fifty years ago. Let us resist the lie that there are equal opportunities for all. That is simply not true. Obstructions continue to be placed in front of some, simply because they are different. Religions are twisted beyond recognition by those possessed with the demons of hatred. Sadly, disrespect is the order of the day. We must stand up for the God who creates every person with dignity. We must walk with all of God's children.

As those who follow Jesus, the prophet and savior, let us risk our lives for the sake of those still oppressed. This, for us, is what it means to bear the cross and follow the Christ.

**Walking Through Holy Week** - Join us Wednesday, April 1, as we gather together as a church family to celebrate and remember the events leading up to Christ's death and resurrection.

**Spark (Newborn - 3 year old)** enjoy Bible stories, songs and games in the nursery with teachers Laura Schillinger and our Sunday caregivers. In March our children will explore stories of Mary and Martha (Luke 10:38-42), Zacchaeus (Luke 19:1-10), Last Supper (John 13:1-20), and Holy Week (Luke 19:28-40; 22:14-23:56).

**Power Xpress** (**4 year old - Grade 5**) Are divided into two ages groups and experience Bible stories through interactive rotation classes. March 4 and 11: Who is Jesus? (Luke 9:18-21; Matthew 16:13-17; Mark 8:27-29). As Christians, we believe the Bible gives many examples to help people discover that Jesus is the Messiah, the special one sent by God. March 18 and 25: The Lord's Supper (Luke 22:1-20; Matthew 26:17-30). Jesus gave his disciples, and us, a way to remember him and all that he taught us.

We Believe: The Story of God's Faithfulness (Grades 6-8) Room 209 with Jana Schillinger and Dick Cochrane. Using We Believe: The Story of God's Faithfulness, our Middle School Class will spend the year digging deeper into the Old Testament, learning and experiencing how God revealed himself to the Hebrew people. March journeys into Wisdom Literature (Proverbs 4; 6:1-11; 10; 22; 30:29-31), Job's Story (Job 1-2; 32; 42), and the stories of Holy Week and Easter (Zechariah 12:10, Luke 22-24).

PresbyYouth's Resurrection and Revelation unit challenges students to dig deeper in their understanding of the resurrection and examines the book of Revelation as statement of faith. The conversation begins with a look at Jesus' Resurrection in Reformed Theology (Mark 16:1-8; Luke 24:1-53; Matthew 28:1-20), Faith Not Proof (John 20-21), Resurrection, Resuscitation, Reincarnation (Acts 2:32-36; Romans 1:3-4; 1 Corinthians 15:12-26), God's Reign In Our Midst (Matthew 27:62-66; Matthew 28:11-15), and The Kingdom Yet To Come (Matthew 24:3-36; Mark 13:1-37; Luke 21:5-36).

**Coming Home To God** Room 206. March 4-25: *Repentance, Renewal and Redemption*. Rev. James Martin leads us into a Lenten journey focusing on Scriptures that reveal themes of repentance, renewal and redemption and what they mean for our life as members of the Body of Christ in the this world.

**Faith and Life** Room 210. March 4-25: *Disciplines for the Spirit:* Rev. Bill Carter and friends will explore the invitation of Jesus to live generously, to pray "in the closet," and to fast in a culture obsessed with consumption. Each week we will unpack another aspect of Jesus' words in Matthew 6:1-21.




#### **Wednesday Supper Reservations**

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## Arts at FPC: Piano-Organ Duo + Marywood Chamber Singers Sunday, March 29, 2015 • 4:00 pm

The first half of this program will include piano-organ duets performed by two virtuosos on their instruments - Rick Hoffenberg on piano and Mark Laubach on organ. Mr. Laubach last played at the church fifteen years ago when we celebrated the renovations we made to our organ and sanctuary.

The second half will feature the Marywood University Chamber Singers, a select group of vocalists from Marywood University. The ensemble is directed by Dr. Hoffenberg, an Associate Professor at Marywood University, where he serves as Director of Choral Activities and Coordinator of Vocal and Keyboard Studies. The group's repertoire encompasses accompanied and a cappella repertoire ranging from masterworks of the Renaissance through world premieres by living composers, as well as vocal jazz.

Dr. Hoffenberg has spent the past 15 summers at Chautauqua Opera, where he is a pianist, coach, and assistant conductor on the music staff.

Mark Laubach is the "dean" of local organists. Since January 1986 he has served as Organist and Choirmaster of St. Stephen's Episcopal Church in Wilkes-Barre, where he administers an active liturgical and choral music program, concert series, and Music from St. Stephen's, a radio broadcast heard weekly on WVIA-FM Public Radio. Since winning first prize in the 1984 American Guild of Organists (AGO) National Competition, Mark has performed in many of the most prominent churches and concert halls in the USA, and in Great Britain and Germany. Canon Laubach teaches organ students privately and at Marywood University in Scranton.

#### Mission and Justice Committee News

#### **Earth Care Information**

Springtime is often clean-up time. Here is some information regarding disposal of special items.

Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) consists of wastes produced in our homes that are hazardous in nature, but are not regulated as hazardous waste, under federal and state laws. Each person in PA produces an average of 4 pounds of HHW each year or about 25,000 tons/yr. statewide. If not managed properly, HHW can cause environmental and public health hazards. HHW includes: oil-based paint, stains, varnish, paint thinner, shellac, antifreeze, gasoline motor oil, pool chemicals, pesticides, weed killers, caulking compounds, septic tank degreasers, mothballs, oven/rug/wood/metal cleaners, toilet bowl cleaners, fire extinguishers, rechargeable batteries, CFLs, mercury-bearing thermostats/thermometers, and propane cylinders (20 lbs or less). Latex paint is not hazardous; to properly dispose, take lid off, add kitty litter, and allow to dry completely (to a solid). Many PA counties offer HHW collection events or ongoing collection programs. Electronics waste is also accepted at some HHW collection events/programs. For more info, go to Dept. of Environmental Protection's website and type "HHW" as the keyword or contact Lackawanna County Recycling Center at 570-963-2017.

#### Eco Palms

The Eco-Palms program protects forests and local jobs and provides sustainable livelihoods. With the work of various ecumenical partners, Bryce Wiebe, mission associate with the Presbyterian Hunger Program estimates that nearly \$1 million is infused in participating communities. The ecofriendly fronds come from communities in Mexico and Guatemala, and workers receive fair wages for practicing sustainable harvesting that protects the local ecosystem. It provides a stable source of income for families. The annual Palm Sunday premium has provided scholarships for elementary school children who would not otherwise have attended school and has helped young women to attend college. It has also provided jobs that did not exist previously for women in the communities. Wiebe estimates more than 300 million palm fronds are harvested each year for U.S. consumption alone. Last year, 974 Presbyterian congregations participated in the Eco-Palms program.
