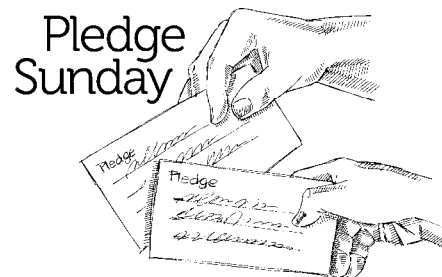

From the Pastor

William G. Carter

I grew up in a church that had names inscribed on the stained glass windows. When my mind would drift, as it still does, I would look around the sanctuary and remember people that I never met.

There were plaques on the walls, too, noting the names of people who had served the congregation for a long stretch of time. One plaque bore the name of someone I had known in childhood, the Rev. Edgar Frank, who served as pastor for a tremendously long time. One of our youth group leaders joked that it was his headstone and he was buried somewhere in the walls. I could almost believe it!

If our walls could talk, what names would they remember? Over the 103 years of our Presbyterian history in Clarks Summit, a number of people have come to live and work among us, and then some of them have moved on. All of them have left a footprint among our fellowship. We continue to hear their voices, remember their values, and thank them for their gifts.

Christian faith is not an individual faith. A church is a tribe. As with any such fellowship, we sit around the proverbial campfire to share the stories of how we began and what we are called to do. A church changes whenever a baby is born or a wise one dies. For those who were here first, the essential value is hospitality. We welcome the newcomers and the strangers, in the same way we were welcomed by Christ. We say, "God has brought you here somehow, and while we are here together, we regard you as kin."

Of course the signs of this communal approach to the faith are all around us. There aren't a lot of memorial plaques on our walls, nor many windows with names inscribed. But open the front cover of a purple hymnal and discover who is remembered. You will find there the name of someone cherished by God, the name of someone who has shaped the life and work of this congregation, if only because she or he affected the life of the person who remembers.

Paul addressed one of his letters this way: "To the church of God that is in Corinth, to those who are sanctified in Christ Jesus, called to be saints, together with all those who in every place call on the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, both their Lord and ours" (1 Corinthians 1:2). Within a few paragraphs, we discover what a feisty, imperfect congregation they were. They had doubts and inconsistencies. They squabbled over rank and entitlement. The Corinthian church debated the issues of the day, disagreed on the names of their favorite preachers, and doubted the resurrection . . . Yet Paul refers to them as "saints," made holy, not by their own excellence, but by the cross and resurrection of Jesus Christ.

God works out the saving of the world through a company of unfinished saints. That's the truth of the Christian faith. It has been going on for many generations. If some of us are strangely awakened in faith by the power of the Holy Spirit, we are not the first ones. Nor will we be the last. That is the promise of the Lord Jesus Christ, "both their Lord and ours."

Happy All Saints Day, brothers and sisters. Pause some time today to thank God for the people who have pointed you toward Jesus, their Lord and ours.

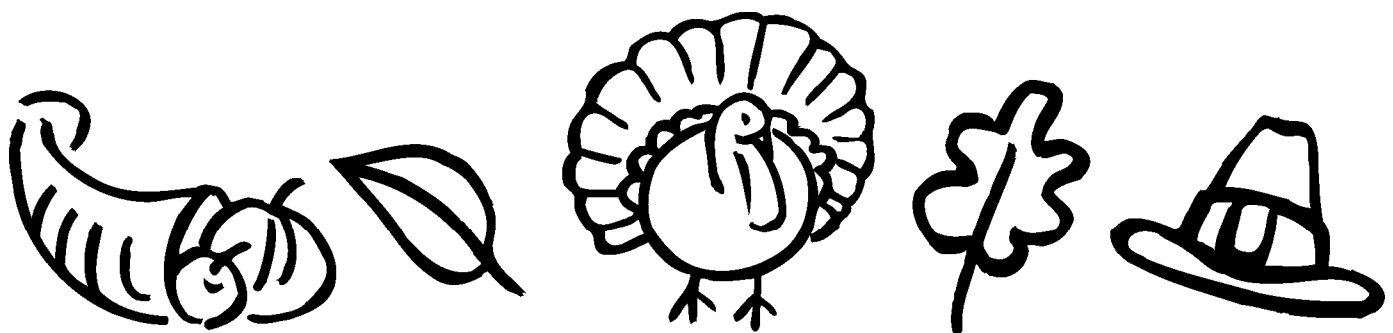

Join us as we break from Christmas chaos and dwell in the Advent themes of love, hope, joy, peace and Christ.

- ◆ **Spark (Newborn - 3 year old)** - This class enjoy Bible stories, songs and games in the nursery. Stories this month are Battle of Jericho (Joshua 6:1-20), David and Goliath (1 Samuel 17:4-11, 32-50) and Elijah and the Widow (1 Kings 17:8-16).
- ◆ **Power Xpress (4 year old - Grade 5)** - This group is divided into two age groups and experience Bible stories through interactive rotation classes. In November we will learn about Samuel (1 Samuel 1:9-27; 3:1-20) and Ruth (The book of Ruth).
- ◆ **We Believe: With All Boldness and Freedom (Grades 6-8)** Room 209. This year students will work through the New Testament to gain the overall picture of the life of Jesus and the early church. This month's lessons focus on Assembling the Disciples (Luke 5:1-32; John 1:43-51; Mark 10:46-52), Teaching by Word and Deed (Luke 14; Matthew 5:3-12; Mark 4:23-5:2), Jesus as Healer (Mark 6:53-56; Matthew 17:14-21; Mark 8:22-26;).
- ◆ **PresbyYouth: Prophetic Calls For Justice (Grades 9-12; college age adults)** Room 111. This course looks at the prophets' words of judgment and hope and their relevance to today's world. November's lessons look at The Exile (Psalm 137; 146; 149; Jeremiah 29), Ezekiel (Ezekiel 1-3; 8-11; 37) and Joel (Joel 1-3).
- ◆ **Talking About God Stuff (T.A.G.S.)** Room 206. October 14-November 18: *Esther*. Esther's story shows God's deliverance and care for his people amid risky twists, turns, happy and fearful moments and dangerous and deadly outcomes. As we venture through the book of Esther, we are reminded that God keeps his age-old promises even in today's world. Char Lyon is the leader.
- ◆ **Faith and Life** Room 210. October 28-November 18: *See You on Sunday*. Rev. Bill Carter leads a four-week conversation about worship. What are we doing on Sunday mornings? What does it have to do with the rest of our week—and the rest of our lives? We will be guided by the Presbyterian Church's proposed revisions to the “Directory of Worship” in our Book of Order.

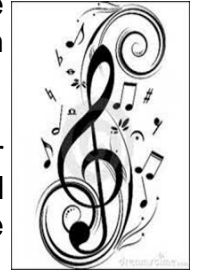

The Mission and Justice Committee would like to thank you for your generous contributions to the Peace and Global Witness Offering. You contributed \$1,219.00, which surpassed our goal of \$1000.00. One quarter of that, or \$304.75, is pledged to the Catherine McAuley Center in Scranton. Our committee decided we would add a mission gift of \$695.25, so that \$1000.00 will be given to the Center from our church.

Jacques Williamson, whose nickname is Yaya, is a 29 year old Haitian friend of several members of our church. He has been awarded the prestigious and new Keystone College International Education and Peace (full-tuition) Scholarship by President David Coppola. He will be studying education and will return to Haiti after obtaining his degree to improve education in his home country. Dave and Donna Porter will supply his room and board, as he will be part of their family. We can all expect to meet and welcome him after his arrival. The Mission and Justice Committee plans to help support him with love, kindness, respect, and with financial assistance for some of his additional expenses. Water Safety as Related to Prescription Medication (www.health.harvard.edu/newsletter)

We often take clean, safe water for granted, as our public water systems are monitored for nearly eighty harmful substances. Environmental experts, though, are becoming concerned with the disposal of prescription drugs that make their way into lakes, ponds, and streams. The typical American medicine cabinet is full of unused and expired drugs, which are often disposed of improperly, and sewage and water treatment plants are not currently designed to remove pharmaceuticals from water.

4 ways to reduce pharmaceutical footprint

- ◆ Limit bulk purchases (reduces waste)
- ◆ Use drug take-back programs
- ◆ Do not flush unused medications or pour them down the drain
- ◆ Be careful how you throw medications in the trash

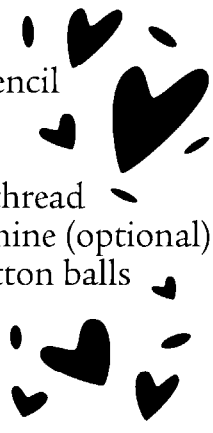

Thankful Hearts

Make table decorations that serve as Thanksgiving conversation-starters.


What you need:

- Paper and pencil
- Scissors
- Cloth or felt
- Needle and thread
- Sewing machine (optional)
- Fiber fill, cotton balls or rice
- Adult help



What you do:

1. Cut out a heart pattern (any size) on paper. Allow 1/4" for a seam if you'll be using a sewing machine.
2. Cut out material hearts, placing pieces right sides out if sewing by hand and right sides together if using a machine.
3. For hand-sewing, use a running stitch or an overcast stitch. Leave an opening for stuffing.
4. With a machine, sew along a 1/4" seam, allowing a 1" opening so you can turn the heart inside out and insert stuffing. Trim close to seam but don't cut stitching.
5. Fill with stuffing. Sew the opening shut by hand.
6. Put a heart at each place setting. Before dinner, have guests pick theirs up and say why they have a thankful heart.

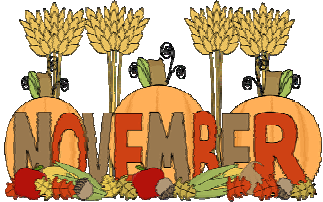
