- 4. If anyone is interested in serving communion during the year, please let Nancy Post or Beverly Bright know your availability. New lists for the upcoming year are being prepared.


Can you read music? Can you count to four (and occasionally six)?

Dear Friends,

I am excited about the direction of our congregation! At a recent meeting, our Session set three goals to guide us into the next few years. Over the next three issues of this newsletter, I will use this space to write about each one.

Here is the first:

• Loving Our Neighbors -- To reach into the community through specific acts of service, improving the neighborhood, and inviting people to experience the love and service of this congregation.

No doubt you will remember that this theme comes from the mouth of Jesus (Luke 10:27), and that he lifted it from the book of Leviticus (19:18). It reaches back as early as Cain's defiant cry, "Am I my brother's keeper?" (Genesis 4:9). It speaks the church's ongoing conscience: "How does God's love abide in anyone who has the world's goods and sees a brother or sister in need and yet refuses to help?" (1 John 3:17)

The love for your neighbor is not a warm, gushy emotion that comes out of a faucet on demand. It is action for their benefit and well-being. Such love steps over the invisible walls that we construct to insulate and isolate. This is love that refuses to let strangers be strangers. Love is not "envious, boastful, arrogant, or rude." Like Jesus, love comes down from any presumption of superiority and comes alongside others who have been equally created in the image of God.

This kind of love is the essential move of a living Christian community. The consultant Thom Rainer has worked with thousands of congregations, many of them in decline and trouble. When asked about the most common reason for their difficulty, he replied clearly, "The surest indicator of decline is a persistent inward focus." As he observed in a recent article,

"The ministries are only for the members. The budgetary funds are used almost exclusively to meet the needs of the members. The times of worship and worship styles are geared primarily for the members. Conflict takes place when members don't get their way. You get the picture."

So what's the antidote? Looking beyond ourselves and loving our neighbors. That is our goal. You may have noticed that this theme has been seeping into some of my sermons this summer. And it's about to get very specific! On the very next page of this newsletter, you will see a full-page description of nine projects that our church will undertake at the end of September. We will do these projects, not as some kind of marketing ploy, but because we want to actively help other people in ways that are helpful for them. This is what Christian people do, and this is your invitation to jump in and take part.

Let me mention other opportunities for us. We can't effectively serve our neighbors if we don't know who they are. To that end, we have asked the Rev. Virginia Miner, our acting General Presbyter, to lead a three week adult class for our WAY program. At 6:15 pm on September 14, 21, and 28, Virginia will guide us through the demographic information about our immediate community. It is eye-opening material, and necessarily so; we can't truly love our neighbors if we don't see them.

So let us love, not in platitudes nor empty speech, but specific acts of service. In so doing, we honor Jesus Christ, who has come down from heaven and alongside us to redeem the world.

Worship through Service Day, September 25

We have dedicated the last weekend of September as a time of service. As we reach out to the needs of our neighborhood, here is what you can do to help. Sign up on Sundays or online at www.fpccs.org:

- The Fellowship Committee's project will paint two rooms and a bathroom on Sunday, September 25, at United Cerebral Palsy of Northeastern Pennsylvania's facility at 423 Center Street in Clarks Summit. UCP will supply all materials. They could use 10 12 people for two to three hours. (Contact Adrienne Horger with questions.)
- The Finance Committee is **collecting and distributing items for the Women's Resource Center in Scranton**. The Center provides services for victims of domestic violence, sexual assault, dating violence, and stalking in Lackawanna and Susquehanna Counties. (Contact David Naeher with questions.)
- The Mission and Justice Committee invites you to help **clean up Hemlock Park**, located on Hemlock Street right behind Moe's. We will be power washing the composite picnic tables and garbage cans, removing graffiti from the gazebo, painting the park's sign, and weeding the gardens and playground areas. (Contact: Melba Fialko with questions.)
- The Deacons will ask members of the congregation to donate new or gently used books during the last two weeks of August, which will be distributed on September 25 to various facilities. There will be specially marked boxes in Fellowship Hall where donations can be made. (Contact Gwynne Gilbert with questions.)
- My Brother's Keeper group will make a number of Ugly Quilts, sleeping bags from recycled materials to
 prevent hypothermia, for the homeless. On September 25, we invite you to join us in Fellowship Hall right
 after worship, where we will make as many quilts as possible. If you can make a knot, you can help!

- The Building and Grounds committee will make small repairs and assist with yard work at homes of our church members. (Contact Frank Garnecki with questions.)
- The People in Ministry committee is contacting **neighbors** within a three block radius of the church building to **make small repairs and assist with yard work**. This project will happen on Saturday, September 24. (Contact Bill Davis with questions.)
- The Christian Education Committee invites you to spend Saturday morning, September 24, **cleaning up the yard of The Children's Advocacy Center**. It is located on Mulberry Street in Scranton. The garden beds need to be cleaned out and weeded. We will also rake the yard and plant bulbs and flowers. (Contact Nancy Dennen with questions.)
- The Worship, Music, and Arts Committee will present a concert and sing-along at the Allied Rehabilitation Center on Sunday, September 25, at 2:00 p.m. The concert will include members of our choirs, members of the bell choir, and anybody in the church family who likes to sing and make music. MISSION AND JUSTICE

Bread for the World

One of the memberships that FPCCS carries is that of Bread for the World. As Christians, we are called to be good stewards personally and collectively. BFW is a <u>non-partisan collective</u> <u>Christian voice</u> that advocates for responsible public policy decisions addressing hunger here and abroad. Below are examples of two recent legislative victories, which involved years of effort by BFW.

- Global Food Security Act-This bill strengthens food production by focusing assistance on smallholder farmers and emphasizes improved nutrition for mothers and children in the 1,000 days of a child's life between pregnancy and age two. It will benefit many of the more than 795 million chronically malnourished people, including nearly 160 million children. It supports more flexibility in disaster assistance and enabled emergency food assistance to reach Syrian refugees in Jordan, Lebanon, and Turkey.
- Foreign Aid and Transparency Act- This act requires US government agencies to consistently and rigorously monitor and evaluate assistance programs.

My Brothers' Keeper Quilting Group

September will soon be here, and My Brothers' Keeper quilting group will have its first session on September 13, 10:00 AM to Noon.

We mix and match fabric into two 7' x 7' squares, fill them with those "what do I do with these old blankets, afghans, scrap material, etc." and lovingly knot them, sew around the edges, and add two neckties for a handle, to create a warm and somewhat comfortable place for someone to crawl into for a night.

We want to thank everyone who has donated items to our group. The sheets, towels, blankets, personal items, scarves, hats, mittens, ties, etc. are what allows us to do this ministry for the homeless. Please continue to think of us. Bless you for your gifts.

Peace and Global Witness Offering



W.A.Y. Kick-off - Sunday September 11, following service!

Beginning September 14th

The W.A.Y. begins Wednesday, September 14!

Spark (Newborn - 3 year old) enjoy Bible stories, songs and games in the nursery. In September these kids will be learning about Adam and Eve, the First Sin, and Joseph and his brothers.

Power Xpress (4 year old - Grade 5) Are divided into two ages groups and experience Bible stories through interactive rotation classes. September's units will be Adam and Eve and Jacob.

For September we will be discussing: Behind the Beautiful Forevers by Katherine Boo. In this brilliant, breathtaking book by Pulitzer Prize winner Katherine Boo, a bewildering age of global change and inequality is made human through the dramatic story of families striving toward a better life in Annawadi, a makeshift settlement in the shadow of luxury hotels near the Mumbai airport. As India starts to prosper, the residents of Annawadi are electric with hope. Abdul, an enterprising teenager, sees "a fortune beyond counting" in the recyclable garbage that richer people throw away. Meanwhile Asha, a woman of formidable ambition, has identified a shadier route to the middle class. With a little luck, her beautiful daughter, Annawadi's "most-everything girl," might become its first female college graduate. And even the poorest children, like the young thief Kalu, feel themselves inching closer to their dreams. But then Abdul is falsely accused in a shocking tragedy; terror and global recession rock the city; and suppressed tensions over religion, caste, sex, power, and economic envy turn brutal. With intelligence, humor, and deep insight into what connects people to one another in an era of tumultuous change, Behind the Beautiful *Forevers,* based on years of uncompromising reporting, carries the reader headlong into one of the twenty-first century's hidden worlds-and into the hearts of families impossible to forget.
