

Dear Friends,

One of the unusual aspects of the Bible's Christmas story is the number of senior citizens who populate the story. Ever notice that?

We don't know the age of mother Mary, although we can presume that she may have been a teenager, as was the custom of the time and culture. Joseph's age is also unknown. He may have been a good bit older than Mary, which might explain why he became absent in the story of the grown-up Jesus. The age of shepherds are unknown, just like their names. Angels, as you can surmise, are timeless.



But look who appears in the Bible's Christmas pageant:

- ◆ Zechariah and Elizabeth, the parents of John the Baptist. The priest and his wife are "getting up in years." Like Abraham and Sarah in the book of Genesis, they do not have children, and believe themselves to be too old. And guess what! (Luke 1:5-25)
- ♦ Simeon stands in the shadows of the Jerusalem temple, waiting for God's Messiah to appear. Luke calls him "righteous and devout," and declares the Holy Spirit has revealed that the Savior will appear before Simeon passes on. (Luke 2:25-35)
- There's a woman of "great age" named Anna. A widow for many years, she, too, lingers around the temple, devoted to worship, fasting, and prayer. She sees the baby Jesus and bursts into ecstatic speech, foreshadowing the Pentecost day when the Holy Spirit will come upon women and men and they will burst into songs and sermons. (Luke 2:36-38)

It seems that Luke is reminding us that the birth of the Christ is for all ages. Christmas must not be wasted on the young. There is something vital and life-giving that comes as God breaks into our world through Jesus. Zechariah sings it after his son John is born:

"By the tender mercy of our God, the dawn from on high shall break upon us, to give light to those who sit in darkness and in the shadow of death, to guide our feet into the way of peace." (Luke 1:78-79)

Our Christian faith is that these words are more than promises or metaphors. They witness to the reality of God's grace, lifting us out of potential despair and dead-end bad habits, and lifting us into a cleansing, healing light. The Christmas story serves to amplify on the small movements of God's Spirit. When we worship together during this season, we are transported to the shepherd's fields so that we can hear the angels sing. We are carried to the shadows of the Jerusalem temple to hear an old man say, "My eyes have seen your salvation, which you have prepared in the presence of all peoples." (Luke 1:30-31)

This is the truth of the Gospel. Light a candle and join us as we rejoice.




There was a successful clean up of our **Adopt-a-Highway** section of the Morgan Highway on Saturday, November 12. Thanks to all church volunteers who participated.

Make this yummy treat to give to family and friends at Christmas,




What you need:

- Nonstick cooking spray
- 3 cups chocolate chips
- Microwave-safe bowl
- Spoon or spatula
- 2 Tbsp. shortening
- Baking tray lined with wax paper
- Red and green M&M's (or sprinkles)

What you do:

- 1. Lightly spray bowl and wax paper.
- 2. Microwave chocolate chips in bowl for one-minute intervals until chocolate is melted. (Stir after each minute.)
- 3. Stir in shortening. Heat in 10-second intervals, stirring until smooth.
- 4. Pour chocolate onto tray and firmly press in M&M's or sprinkles.
- 5. Refrigerate until firm. Remove bark and break into pieces.

Welcome to Wednesdays

Spark (Newborn - 3 year old) enjoy Bible stories, songs and games in the nursery. In December they will be learning about Mary's visit to Elizabeth and the birth of Jesus.

Power Xpress (4 year old - Grade 5) Are divided into two age groups and experience Bible stories through interactive rotation classes. December's unit will be Journey to Bethlehem.



We Believe (Grades 6-8) This fall, students will explore a unit called *Knowing God*, answering questions about who God is and who we are as Christians. In December, we will answer: How Strong is God's Power? and What Does My View of God Have to Do with the Way I Live My Life?

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We are taking a break in December for the holidays. We will get together again on January 26, 2017 at Judy Cutler's home. Come join us for a discussion of The Nest by Cynthia D'Aprix Sweeney. Every family has its problems. But even among the most troubled, the Plumb family stands out as dysfunctional. Years of simmering tensions reach a breaking point on a cold afternoon in New York City as Melody, Beatrice, and Jack Plumb gather to confront their charismatic and reckless older brother. Leo, freshly released from rehab. Months earlier, an inebriated Leo got behind the wheel of a car with a nineteen-year-old waitress as his passenger. The ensuing accident has endangered the Plumbs' joint trust fund, "The Nest," which they are months away from finally receiving.

Meant by their deceased father to be a modest mid-life supplement, the Plumb siblings have watched The Nest's value soar along with the stock market and have been counting on the money to solve a number of self-inflicted problems. Melody, a wife and mother in an upscale suburb, has an unwieldy mortgage and looming college tuition for her twin teenage daughters. Jack, an antiques dealer, has secretly borrowed against the beach cottage he shares with his husband, Walker, to keep his store open. And Bea, a once-promising short-story writer, can't seem to finish her overdue novel. Can Leo rescue his siblings and the people they love? Or will everyone need to reimagine the futures they've envisioned?

Brought together as never before, Leo, Melody, Jack, and Beatrice must grapple with old resentments, present-day truths, and the significant emotional and financial toll of the accident, as well as finally acknowledge the choices they have made in their own lives.

This is a story about the power of family, the possibilities of friendship, the ways we depend upon one another and the ways we let one another down. In this tender, entertaining, and deftly written debut, Cynthia D'Aprix Sweeney brings a remarkable cast of characters to life to illuminate what money does to relationships, what happens to our ambitions over the course of time, and the fraught yet unbreakable ties we share with those we love.

A few weeks ago I had to find something in my file cabinet. It was strange territory for me as Jo was also my secretary, as most of you know. As I found what I needed, in closing the drawer I noticed a manila folder with nothing written on it, so out of simple curiosity I opened it and found the following.

But before you read it.....Jo was eleven years younger than I was, and with my age and a health issue it was our belief that she would have to plan my demise and apparently at a time unknown to me she was putting her Ducks in order. This is what I found in the folder:

GOD HAS CALLED ME

Death is nothing at all. It does not count. I have only slipped away into the next room. Nothing has happened. Everything remains exactly as it was. I am I, and you are you, and the old life that we lived so fondly together is untouched, unchanged. Whatever we were to each other, that we are still. Call me by the old familiar name. Life means all that it ever meant. It is the same as it ever was. There is absolute and unbroken continuity. What is death but a negligible accident? Why should I be out of mind because I am out of sight? I am but waiting for you, for an interval, somewhere very near, just around the corner. All is well!
