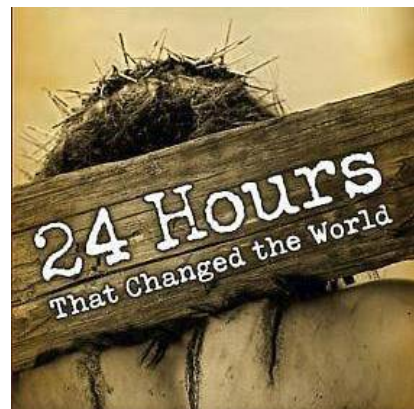

Join us for our weekly adult education on Wednesdays

On Wednesdays in Lent, we gather for **24 Hours That Changed the World**. Based on the popular book by Adam Hamilton, these weekly sessions will help us understand the significance of Jesus' suffering and death. Hamilton retraces the day that changed human history in a straightforward and conversational style that speaks to both long-time Christians and those who are curious about Christ's crucifixion.

The weekly sessions will draw upon insights from history, archaeology, geography, and Biblical accounts. We will view the sites in the Holy Land where the events of Holy Week took place, and walk with Jesus as he traveled the road that led to the pain and triumph of the cross. **Join us each Wednesday in Room 206 at 6:15 p.m.**



Also available in Lent: In Room 210, we will have a gathering to view **Ancient Roads from Christ to Constantine**, an outstanding video history of the early church from PBS. Each week will lead us on a visually stunning journey to the beautiful and important places of early Christianity, starting from where Christianity was born, growing from a small movement called "The Way," to its eventual place as the official religion of the Roman Empire. **See you in Room 210 at 6:15 p.m.**

From the Pastor

March 2017

As I write these words, there is noise on the sanctuary roof. You may know that we are having repairs on the slate above our worship space. Apparently a previous contractor had drilled holes through the stone panels to attach some materials. This was not done carefully, and allowed rain water to seep through and create some rot in the plywood beneath.



It's a captivating metaphor for what can happen to our lives.

Lent is the season to address the "inner rot." Where has damage seeped in? What have we been neglecting? How do we acknowledge the punctures - and what might we do to repair them?

For me, it prompts any number of personal questions:

- ◆ If I have doubts about the goodness of God, how can I find out more about God by reading the Bible?
- ◆ If my life is confusing and cluttered, what could I do to center my spirit?
- ◆ If I bear a grudge against a person that I have come to hate, how can I release it?
- ◆ If I am feeling despair after reading the daily news, what can I do to reclaim my hope and work for good?
- ◆ If we are disgusted about the enormous disparity between those who have a lot and those who have little, how could I simplify my life and share what I have with those in need?
- ◆ If there are personal habits that are sapping the health out of my body and spirit, how can I replace them with practices that increase my well-being?
- ◆ If I am feeling distant from God, what could I do to draw closer?

The spiritual disciplines of the Christian life can help: Bible reading, meditation, confession and forgiveness, generosity, good works, care for the physical body, and prayer. We provide opportunities to officially gather as a church family to do and encourage these practices. If you ever want to drop by for coffee and talk about them one-on-one, I would always welcome that.

It's Lent. Spring training for the soul!

PRESBYTERIAN WOMEN MEET MARCH 21

In our previous six lessons, we have studied "Who is Jesus" according to the canonical gospels (Matthew, Mark, Luke and John), the Pauline epistles and Hebrews. The context and perspective of the authors help shape the lenses through which they see and present Jesus.

This month's lesson will discuss some non-canonical gospels – gospels not included in our New Testament. Can we see why these writings do not reflect the Jesus that came to dominate the world of Christianity? Yet, can they help us better see the diversity of early Christianity reflected by a small group of Jesus' followers in particular areas?

On the third Tuesday of each month, we welcome all women to join us in any circle at a time that fits for you. Dorcas Circle meets at 10:00 a.m., Priscilla Circle meets at 1:30 p.m. and Eunice Circle meets at 7:00 p.m. All meet at the church. We learn together and the fellowship is GREAT!

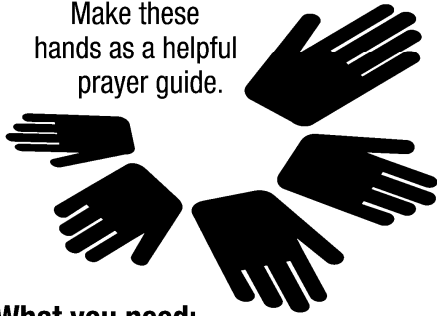


We will meet at Barbara Brown's home on March 23rd at 7:00. Join us for a discussion of **Princess: A True Story of Life Behind the Veil in Saudi Arab** by Jean P. Sasson. Sultana is a Saudi Arabian princess, a woman born to fabulous, uncountable wealth. She has four mansions on three continents, her own private jet, glittering jewels, designer dresses galore. But in reality she lives in a gilded cage. She has no freedom, no control over her own life, no value but as a bearer of sons. Hidden behind her black floor-length veil, she is a prisoner, jailed by her father, her husband, her sons, and her country. Sultana is a member of the Saudi royal family, closely related to the king. For the sake of her daughters, she has decided to take the risk of speaking out about the life of women in her country, regardless of their rank. She must hide her identity for fear that the religious leaders in her country would call for her death to punish her honesty. Only a woman in her position could possibly hope to escape from being revealed and punished, despite her cloak and anonymity.

Sultana tells of her own life, from her turbulent childhood to her arranged marriage--a happy one until her husband decided to displace her by taking a second wife--and of the lives of her sisters, her friends and her servants. Although they share affection, confidences and an easy camaraderie within the confines of the women's quarters, they also share a history of appalling oppressions, everyday occurrences that in any other culture would be seen as shocking human rights violations; thirteen-year-old girls forced to marry men five times their age, young women killed by drowning, stoning, or isolation in the women's room, a padded, windowless cell where women are confined with neither light nor conversation until death claims them. By speaking out, Sultana risks bringing the wrath of the Saudi establishment upon her head and the heads of her children. But by telling her story to Jean Sasson, Sultana has allowed us to see beyond the veils of this secret society, to the heart of a nation where sex, money, and power reign supreme.

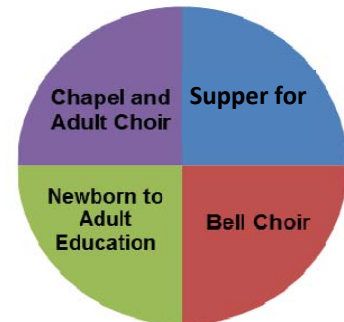
IMPORTANT DATE**Wednesday, March 1** - Ash Wednesday - classes will be held from 6:15-6:55, followed immediately by worship.

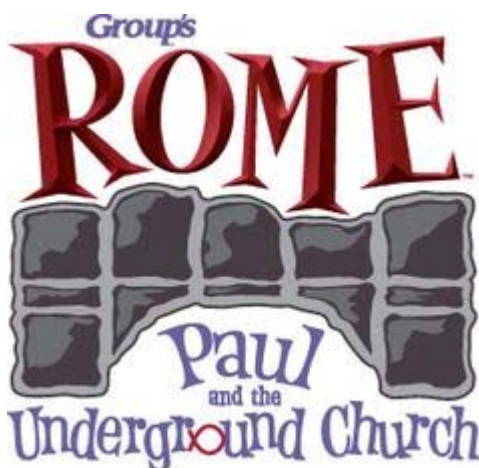

I say this because when we humans need somebody to tell our problems to, we turn to Jesus; but sometimes we would like to talk to a person who could assist us by listening to our problems and possibly offering suggestions concerning the issue at hand.

You can talk to a Stephen Minister who will listen to you, pray with you and keep all your thoughts private. A Stephen Minister can work with you at your convenience for as long as you need and can seek other avenues to support you.

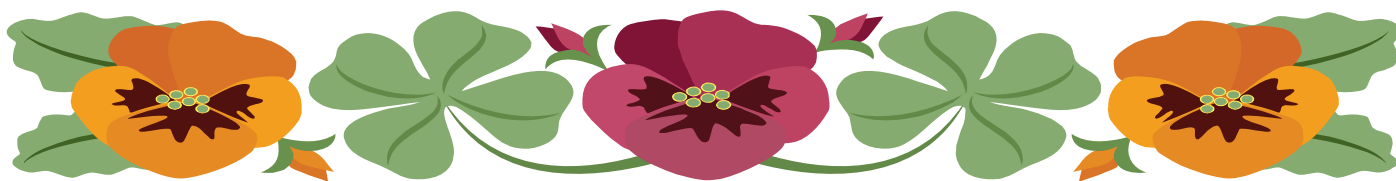
Dexter has Jim to console him. Stephen Ministers are here for you. It only takes a phone call.
