#### Shake . . . Rattle . . . Believe

As we approach Holy Week, I wanted to give you a head's up: this is the "Year of Matthew." Just like the others, the first gospel tells the story of Palm Sunday, the Cross, and Easter. We will hear the familiar story of our redemption. But Matthew is very particular about repeating an important detail: *the whole city shook.* 



Palm Sunday, for instance, is a seismic event. As Jesus rode his donkey into town, the people sang "hosanna" and the whole city shook. The verb "shook" is the work "seismos." It's earthquake language. That is curious since Matthew is normally a straight-shooter who doesn't talk in metaphors. Yet when he says Jerusalem was "shaking," he means to say that Jesus came to town and suddenly it was 9.7 on the Richter scale! *The whole city shook* (28:10 - "in turmoil" is the way the NRSV translates it). The religious leaders were greatly disturbed.

When Jesus was crucified on Friday, the religious leaders were pretty sure that he wouldn't interfere with them ever again. It took a few hours to watch and ensure he wasn't breathing any more. And then what happened? Matthew says that at the very moment of Jesus' death, *the earth shook and shuddered.* (Matthew 27:51) The rocks split. The tombs opened. The temple tapestry ripped in two. Finally it was quiet. They took him down and sealed him in a tomb. Everybody thought, "Jesus will not ever bother anybody again."

And then, on Sunday, the first day of the week, some women went to his tomb in the early morning. And just as they got there, *the ground began to shake.* (28:2) The large stone that sealed the tomb had been rolled away and their lives would never again be the same.

If we come every Holy Week to see Jesus ride into town, it is easy to get the picture wrong. He looks like a gentle prophet on the back of a humble donkey, surrounded by a crowd that sings the same, old psalms. But let's not be naive. When God sends Jesus into town, there is a whole lot of shaking going on.

The truth of Holy Week is that we can never stand totally secure in our own strength. We can never declare ourselves free from God's interference in our lives. And we may be provoked by two continuing questions: Who is this Jesus? And what right does he have to shake us up?

He is Savior and Lord. He saves us as he gives himself that we would be reconciled with God. And as Lord, he is the One who has authority over all things, even death.

Come and worship with us for Holy Week. It is going to be a rich and deeply meaningful festival of faith.

## JESUS IS **RISEN!**


When Jesus' disciples saw that the stone was rolled away from his tomb, they knew he had risen. Make a moveable tomb to celebrate Easter.

#### What you need:

- 4 pieces of paper (brown, blue, black, yellow)
- Scissors
- Pencil
- Glue stick
- Brad fastener
- Marker



- 1. Fold the brown paper in half, short side to short side. Cut along the fold. On one half, draw and cut out a large half-circle (the tomb). On the other, draw and cut out a palm-sized circle (the stone).
- 2. Glue the brown tomb onto the blue paper.
- 3. Cut a black circle (the inside of the tomb) the same size as the brown stone and glue it onto the brown tomb.
- 4. Place the brown stone over the black half-circle; this is the entrance. Push the brad through one edge so the stone can move from side to side.
- 5. Cut out a cross from the yellow paper and glue it by the tomb.
- 6. Write "Jesus is risen!" atop the blue paper.

**Sunday, April 9** - Palm Sunday - following worship, join us downstairs for a special Christian Education program intended for all ages, *Sensing Resurrection*: a multisensory exploration of the events of Holy Week.

**Spark** (**Newborn - 3 year old**) enjoy Bible stories, songs and games in the nursery. In April they will hear stories about the Last Supper, Holy Week, the Empty Tomb, and the Road to Emmaus.

**Power Xpress (4 year old - Grade 5)** Experience Bible stories through interactive rotation classes. In April they will continue to discover the Symbols of Holy Week as well as to learn the Easter story from Peter's perspective.

## A Simple, Powerful Way to Care for People Who Are Grieving

<u>Journeying through Grief</u> is a set of four short books to send to people at four crucial times during the first year after the loss of a loved one.

Author <u>Kenneth C. Haugk</u> writes in a warm, caring style, with short, easy-to-read chapters. He walks alongside the reader through the grief journey, sharing helpful insights about grief, biblical truths, and stories that provide comfort and reassurance.

#### Four Books at Four Crucial Times

Book 1: A Time to Grieve

... sent 3 weeks after the loss

Book 2: Experiencing Grief

... sent 3 months after the loss

Book 3: Finding Hope and Healing

... sent 6 months after the loss

**Book 4: Rebuilding and Remembering** 

... sent 11 months after the loss

Each book focuses on what the person is likely to be experiencing at that point in grief—offering understanding, empathy, compassion, and hope.

Mitch Albom creates his most unforgettable fictional character—Frankie Presto, the greatest guitarist to ever walk the earth—in this magical novel about the bands we join in life and the power of talent to change our lives.

In his most stunning novel yet, the voice of Music narrates the tale of its most beloved disciple, young Frankie Presto, a war orphan raised by a blind music teacher in a small Spanish town. At nine years old, Frankie is sent to America in the bottom of a boat. His only possession is an old guitar and six precious strings.

But Frankie's talent is touched by the gods, and his amazing journey weaves him through the musical landscape of the 20th century, from classical to jazz to rock and roll, with his stunning talent affecting numerous stars along the way, including Hank Williams, Elvis Presley, Carole King, Wynton Marsalis and even KISS.
