Happy New Year, my friends! As we are putting away Christmas, I have found three Epiphany poems by my friend Tom Troeger. I pass them along with his permission, in the great hope that we can live this year in the light of Christ:

A star not mapped on human charts disturbed the eastern skies and the stirred the questing minds and hearts of three kings rich and wise. Attracted by the mystic light their science did not frame, they travelled through the cloud of night to learn its holy name.

That star which cheered the seeking soul announcing Christ was here, made Herod plot to keep control through violence, lies and fear. The tyrant hid his anxious thought and said "Report to me when you have found the child you've sought that I might come and see."

That star above our shadowed earth now moved across the skies and marked the place of holy birth before the wise men's eyes. They offered incense, myrrh, and gold while on their knees to pray. Then through a dream the kings were told: "Go home another way."



Origin by Dan Brown

Robert Langdon, Harvard professor of symbology and religious iconology, arrives at the ultramodern Guggenheim Museum Bilbao to attend a major announcement—the unveiling of a discovery that "will change the face of science forever." The eve-



ning's host is Edmond Kirsch, a forty-year-old billionaire and futurist whose dazzling high-tech inventions and audacious predictions have made him a renowned global figure. Kirsch, who was one of Langdon's first students at Harvard two decades earlier, is about to reveal an astonishing breakthrough . . . one that will answer two of the fundamental questions of human existence.

As the event begins, Langdon and several hundred guests find themselves captivated by an utterly original presentation, which Langdon realizes will be far more controversial than he ever imagined. But the meticulously orchestrated evening suddenly erupts into chaos, and Kirsch's precious discovery teeters on the brink of being lost forever. Reeling and facing an imminent threat, Langdon is forced into a desperate bid to escape Bilbao. With him is Ambra Vidal, the elegant museum director who worked with Kirsch to stage the provocative event. Together they flee to Barcelona on a perilous quest to locate a cryptic password that will unlock Kirsch's secret.

Navigating the dark corridors of hidden history and extreme religion, Langdon and Vidal must evade a tormented enemy whose all-knowing power seems to emanate from Spain's Royal Palace itself . . . and who will stop at nothing to silence Edmond Kirsch. On a trail marked by modern art and enigmatic symbols, Langdon and Vidal uncover clues that ultimately bring them face-to-face with Kirsch's shocking discovery . . . and the breathtaking truth that has long eluded us.






