The duo will be joined by Hwaen Ch'uqi, piano; Amy Iwazumi, violin; and John Michael Vaida, viola.

Dear Friends,



I came late to Holy Humor Sunday. Not literally, and not this year, but "late" in the sense that I didn't think it was proper and appropriate for Christian worship.

As a child of the '60's, I was painfully aware of innovations that attempted to update the Christian faith. *Jesus Christ Superstar* was rocking and cool, but *Godspell* was suspicious: Jesus was portrayed in white grease paint, red nose, and suspenders, cracking jokes and handing out flowers. As far as I was concerned, the Gospel was concerned with sterner stuff.

The opinion was reinforced at Princeton Seminary. In the tall trees of theology, biblical studies, and church history, there was little room for humor in classroom or chapel. Sure, we had our share of pranks to blow off steam; there was that dead Volkswagen Beetle that we hid in a lecture hall after hours. But we dressed up for class and generally didn't smile much.

Imagine my shock and disgust one Friday when clowns showed up for worship — intentionally! Fridays were reserved for students who signed up to lead a service. It was "anything goes," and became known as Freaky Friday. There might be a slide show, or a banjo and bass drum duet, rarely an actual sermon. One day, a number of white-faced classmates romped down the aisle with bullhorns and tricycles, trying to shake up the rest of us. I was immovable. To be fair, the worship planner that day was a Methodist.

My first church never laughed very much. Never smiled much either. In a heavily Pennsylvania Dutch neighborhood, the ancient Welsh saints preferred lugubrious hymns in dank minor keys. They also believed in hard work and lengthy sermons, both of which were fine for me. When Easter came, however, I confess my disappointment that no one wore yellow. "He is Risen Indeed" was spoken in a monotone. No obvious joy.

So a number of years ago, the pastor of a nearby Presbyterian church mentioned Holy Humor Sunday. I thought she was out of her mind. But as she recounted her plan, I leaned forward. "Lent was long enough," she said, "so we begin worship with a benediction and end with a call to worship. The assurance of pardon will be in Pig Latin, in honor of all who ate ham for Easter on behalf of Jesus the Jew." There was a website for the Fellowship of Merry Christians, and they had a Joyful Noiseletter. I decided to explore. I pitched it to the worship committee, and they were more enthusiastic than me. We began modestly, the congregation pushed back for more. So now, we're all in. God save us, we are all in.

Over the past nine or ten years, Holy Humor Sunday has become one of our signature services. As someone said to me recently, "We'll be traveling for Easter, but we will definitely be back for that." I pointed out that last year, Biker Gene delivered my worship bulletin on a motorcycle, but we would do something else this year. "I know," she said, "That's why I don't want to miss it."

OK, OK, I get it. Christ is alive and calls each one of us to be alive. Joyfully alive. So on with the show!

"Even before the full extent of damage from Cyclone Idai is known, government and aid officials are calling it one of the worst natural disasters to hit southern Africa, perhaps even in the Southern Hemisphere, in decades. The storm which first struck Mozambique (on March 15, 2019) before moving inland to Zimbabwe and Malawi, caused widespread flooding throughout the region. It has displaced hundreds of thousands of people in Mozambique alone, and has affected more than a million lives in three of the world's poorest countries." (N.Y. Times, 3/21/19)

Along with multiple organizations helping those affected by the cyclone, Presbyterian Disaster Assistance is responding as well. In the immediate aftermath of the storm, PDA is working with ACT Alliance, a coalition of 151 churches and faith-based organizations, to assess needs and direct funds. The initial focuses will be issues such as controlling water-borne diseases such as cholera and security at shelters for the thousands of displaced people, as well as food and water. Presbyterian Disaster Assistance Associate for International Disaster Response Luke Asikoy says "The need is enormous, and recovery will go on for a number of years." (Presbyterian News Service, March 22, 2019)

The Mission and Justice Committee is pleased to share with you that we have donated \$1,000 to the Presbyterian Disaster Assistance fund directly allocated to the South African countries and peoples affected by Cyclone Idai. Quite a worthy cause!
