From the Pastor November 2019

On the edge of All Saints Day (November 1), here's a bit from a favorite book called Saint-Watching by Phyllis McGinley:



In times of crisis we need saints; and we often breed them, too. They appeared by the hundreds in the first centuries of Christianity when Europe was struggling out of universal darkness into what then passed for the light of civilization. They flourished during the Reformation on both sides of the conflict. Whenever or wherever an evil has existed, from slave-trading to the miseries of famine and war, saints have sprung up to mitigate those evils. They may well be rising among us now, preparing to lead us out of the onrushing night which so threateningly descends . . .

Saints spend their lives and their burning abilities on every sort of necessity they find at hand. Thy care for lepers, foundlings, prisoners of war, idiots, orphans. They defend Jews as did Hugh of Lincoln, who, single-handed, cowed armed and angry mobs in England of the twelfth century or sheltered fugitives in his Episcopal palace. They found hospitals. They teach the ignorant. Like Raymund Nonnatus they give themselves up as hostage for the ransom of slaves and captives. Imagine the most enormous of the corporal acts of mercy, and some saint or contingent of saints has committed it. (New York: Crossroad Publishing, 1982) pp. 16, 25

November is the month for gratitude: gratitude to God for all of heaven's blessings on earth, daily food in all its bounty, and people who witness to God's goodness in the lives they have led. We stand in a long line of spiritual exemplars and good examples, and to quote a favorite hymn about saints, "I want to be one too!"

Yaya Status Report

Williamson Jacques [Yaya], is hoping to complete his education at Keystone College and then return to Haiti in December, but several challenges face him now.

The employment and economic situation in Haiti is terrible at this time. Executive power in Haiti is divided between a prime minister and president led government and its current president, Jovenel Moïse, has been asked to resign, but since he will not resign, protests and violence are now rampant in the city of Port-au-Prince and elsewhere. This violence is created mostly by youth gangs who seem intent on taking over the country city block by city block. The government does not seem willing or able to stop this violence so there is much fear at work in Haiti now. Latest first-hand accounts are that many, perhaps most, businesses and schools are closed for safety and that inflation is increasing daily, particularly the cost of food and fuel.

I am no expert on these socio-political issues, but I do know how they are affecting our son, Yaya. He is fearful about his options and is uncertain what to do. Should he just return to Haiti or find a way to stay in the U.S. long enough for the violence in Haiti to subside, hopefully finding employment in the U.S. and then returning to Haiti to find work again?

He is currently looking into his options of continuing his education at Keystone College for another semester, applying for a work visa, or returning to Haiti and hoping for the best.

This is a difficult time for him. He continues to always express his appreciation for all this church and other friends have done to provide this opportunity for his education. He hopes that he can do something constructive with his education by returning to Haiti to use it. It just does not seem like the right time to return and that is the hurt he currently feels. Prayers, thoughts, conversations on this matter are welcome. Yaya can be contacted at wjacques@keystone.edu.

Keep your eyes open for his graduation celebration activities as we hope to provide him with a small reception at some time in December.

National Donor Sabbath 2019 will be celebrated on November 15 - 17. It seeks to educate faith-based communities about the need for organ and tissue donors. Many churches support organ donation as a way to love one's neighbor.

Nationally, there are approximately 113,000 people waiting for an organ transplant. Every ten minutes, another person is added to the list. On average, 20 people die each day in the United States because the need for organs far exceeds the current number of available life-saving gifts.

The Gift of Life Donor Program is the federally mandated Organ Procurement Organization (OPO) that services eastern PA, southern NJ, and Delaware. Currently in this region there are 5,000 men, women, and children waiting for organ transplants. People of every age give and receive transplants.

Gift of Life Donor Program Impact in 2018:

615 organ donors 1,671 organs transplanted 1,368 musculoskeletal donors (tissue) 2,009 cornea donors

The need is great and you have the power to do something about it, by becoming an organ/tissue donor.

Mission and Justice Committee

The Presbyterian General Assembly "affirms its conviction that neither the Church as the body of Christ, nor Christians as individuals, can be neutral or indifferent toward evil in the world; affirms its responsibility to speak on social and moral issues for the encouragement and instruction of the Church and its members, seeking earnestly both to know the mind of Christ and to speak always in humility and love; reminds the churches that their duty is not only to encourage and train their members in daily obedience to God's will, but corporately to reveal God's grace in places of suffering and need, to resist the forces that tyrannize, and to support the forces that restore the dignity of all men as the children of God, for only so is the gospel most fully proclaimed; . . ." (1958 Statement – PC(USA), p. 537).

The Mission and Justice Committee members are committed to fulfilling the above Presbyterian resolve that we address local, national, and international social, moral, and environmental issues through education of our congregation via table talks and supporting worthy causes financially and in person. Examples of issues addressed are poverty, hunger, homelessness, gun violence, racism, refugee rights, sexual assault prevention, and more. Recent activities that we have sponsored and been part of this autumn were the table talk with the Director of the Scranton Youth Shelter, the Alternative Gift Market (fair trade products), Weinberg Food Bank volunteering (4 x a year), Highway Cleanup, and taking the lead on the Presbyterian Peace and Global Witness Offering. The Alternative Gift Market for 2019 was once again well attended with gifts purchased totaling \$1,896.20. The entities supplying items for sale included SERRV, Heifer International, Reaching the Pygmies Ministry, Appalachia Service Project (ASP), PCUSA Coffee, and Calice Micheiet, who provided colorful paintings and metal depicting his native Haitian culture. Thank you to all who participated in this year's gift market, and also to those members who worked to make it a success.



Thanks to the generosity of this congregation, \$1,502, has been donated toward the **Peace & Global Witness Offering**, 2019. That means that \$375 or 1/4 of the total will be sent to the Florence Immigrant & Refugee Rights Project, while the remainder will be sent to the Presbyterian Mission Agency for

peacemaking efforts in the US and around the world. Thank you again for your participation in this important mission as we strive to offer the peace of Christ at all times and in all ways.

- **Spark Nursery (up to age 4):** A nurturing class for our youngest learners, our nursery class will hear Bible stories, sing songs, play, and participate in activities appropriate to their age.

- Meet Thomas Merton (October 30, November 6, 13, 20) This four-week series will offer an opportunity to learn more about this enigmatic 20th century saint, dig into many of his writings, and explore what his "contemplative activism" might mean for us. 


