
Other activities on Saturday will include a performance at 2 pm of "Honk, Jr" by students from the Creative and Performing Arts Academy's

FOR THE MONTH ENDING DECEMBER 31, 2019

Thank you for your contributions to the 2019 budget. Having received over \$324,000 in pledge income, and considering the good stewardship of the committees, normal expenses only exceeded income by \$225. (These figures exclude the capital expenditures that were undertaken.)

Per Capita received

Budget \$ 4,000 Actual \$3,933 (\$ 67)

Our bill for 2019 per capita, based on membership was \$18,665.

From the Pastor

February 2020

Winter has returned. With it, there comes a stack of books to read, a fireplace to tend, a pot of steaming soup. It is time to enter the cocoon, to rest and reflect, and to anticipate the promise of a far-off spring.

It is also time to reach for a favorite winter book, Martin Marty's *The Promise of Winter: Quickening the Spirit on Ordinary Days and in Fallow Seasons*. Here is his reflection on the topic of "security," based on the Bible verse, "He will raise me beyond reach of distress" (Psalm 27).



After snow is fallen, anyone who is pursued grows freshly alert. The escapee from a prison camp knows that guards will track best in new snow. Those who chase will find the one fleeing easy to follow. No hounded animal would seek more frantically for a place to hide beyond harm's way, whether in sun or shadow.

The running refugee yearns for slight drifts to cover the trails and traces he has left: "If only I had a lookout, a vantage from where I could see but not be seen. Yes, for a place to crouch unnoticed, so I could be free to observe. The pursuer would then tire or grow confused and leave me alone." that kind of dream is realized whenever a divine hand leads, whenever a loving guide provides a hiding place. Such a dream does not have to be a mere fevered fancy gone astray.

Serious persons need invest little imagination to see themselves not pursued but chilled by fear of forces or persons who will not let them come to and ever after enjoy secure places. Fears plague us daily, whether we are apparently succeeding or failing. Feeling assailed, we run away. Bt the experience of being moved beyond danger by God offers a new and daily ever more secure situation of safety and perspective.

Let me be moved to where I can gain a vantage of what is threatening; provide security while I elude the soul's assailants. Amen.

May this be a restorative season for you, sustaining your spirit and strengthening your resolve. Even in the bleak winter, we encounter the wild grace of God.

Becoming by Michelle Obama (400 pages) February 27 @ Nancy Owens' home, 7:00 p.m.

In a life filled with meaning and accomplishment, Michelle Obama has emerged as one of the most iconic and compelling women of our era. As first lady of the United States of America - the first African American to serve in that role - she helped create the most welcoming and inclusive White House in history while also establishing herself as a powerful advocate for women and girls in the United States and around the world, dramatically changing the ways that families pursue healthier and more active lives and standing with her husband as he led America through some of its most harrowing moments. Along the way, she showed us a few dance moves, crushed Carpool Karaoke, and raised two down-to-earth daughters under an unforgiving media glare.

February is Black History month, so we will be holding a table talk after the service on Sunday Feb. 23, 2020 with Reverend Allyson Brundige on "White



Privilege." Allyson has a Master of Divinity degree from Yale University and presently is the chaplain at Choate Rosemary Hall. Allyson has worked both in New Haven and at Choate in addressing racism through community organizing and educating others about racism and white privilege.

In preparation for Reverend Allyson's visit, we will be reading the book *White Fragility: Why It's So Hard for White People to Talk about Racism*_by Robin DiAngelo, PhD and holding discussions about the book following the service on the two Sundays preceding Allyson's table talk (Feb. 9 and 16). We encourage anyone interested in taking part to purchase the book and come join us in meaningful discussions.

Description of the book *White Fragility*: "This New York Times best-selling book explores the counterproductive reactions white people have when their assumptions about race are challenged, and how these reactions maintain racial inequality....In this in-depth exploration, anti-racist educator Robin DiAngelo examines how white fragility develops, how it protects racial inequality, and what can be done to engage more constructively." New "Instant Church Directory" Progress Report

As you probably know, the Fellowship Committee has been working on a new "online" church directory which members can easily access anytime. For the online version, members can put an app on their iPhone, iPad, An-



droid device or Kindle so that the church roster will always be at their fingertips. Members will then use the email address listed in the directory to create their own password. Directories can be printed for those who do not provide an email address or those who would prefer a printed copy.

Regarding security of the directory, Instant Church Directory states the following: "Your account is protected by a username and password that only you should know. Search engines do not crawl any of the directory data located within the password-protected portion. We take your privacy and your church members' privacy very seriously." There are flyers posted around the church entitled "Security Facts" which will further explain the details and hopefully allay any concerns of members of our congregation.

Chris Sekol and Jeanne DeVirgilis have been taking photos during fellowship hour following church so there's not a pushy salesperson trying to sell you pictures that you really don't want. If you have not yet had your photo taken, there's still plenty of time. We can add photos as we receive them. We can change contact information easily so that the online version will always be up-to-date. You can also submit a photo to be downloaded into the program if you would prefer.

Classes Offered:
