## When will we be together again?



That's the big question, isn't it! We have no quick answer, especially since the news reports tell us the coronavirus cases continue. Our Elders and staff miss the physical vitality of our church, but we are not inclined to rush a return if there is the chance that people could become ill. A few of our church members have contracted the disease. While they are on the way to full recovery, they confirm it is a demanding and difficult virus.

Rev. Carter has begun conversations with the Session and staff about our approach to returning to worship together. The return will happen in phases, under the guidance of wise public health authorities. It will not begin before the governor and health officials lift restrictions.

### Here is a snapshot of the developing plan:

- \* When the time is right, we would have two worship services on Sunday at 8:30 and 10:00 a.m.
- \* Initially, attendance at each service would be restricted to 50 people scattered throughout the sanctuary.
- \* The first service would be recorded and broadcast later on that Sunday morning, allowing those who can take part at home to continue doing so.
- \* First priority for the sanctuary services would be for those who haven't been able to do so at home. To this end, we would take advance reservations for the sanctuary service through the church office. Walk-ins could only be accepted if we could keep the attendance at acceptable limits.
- \* We would require face masks and restrict congregational singing. Sanitation precautions would be taken.

Any feedback on the plan? Ways to improve it? Please let us know. Our planning team includes Jay Clymer, Andy Kepler, John Conklin, Frank Jones, and Rev. Bill Carter.

## From the Pastor

This pandemic is an **apocalyptic** moment. That's a ten cent word that the New Testament uses for "an unveiling." The word is borrowed from the dramatic stage, as the curtain opens and we see what has been hidden from us. In other words, a revelation. The big unveiling in the Bible is that God rules over all things. But what are we seeing - and learning - during this smaller apocalypse? Here is my Top Ten list:



**1. All of us are vulnerable.** Welcome to the human race. A virus does not discriminate. Should we?

**2. We need one another.** Selfishness may be intoxicating, but it has been revealed as a scam. In the wisdom of Estonian composer Arvo Part, "This tiny coronavirus has showed us in a painful way that humanity is a single organism and human existence is possible only in relation to other living beings."

**3. Magic doesn't work.** Some well-intentioned Christians quote Psalm 91 with its promise that God will protect us. They forget this is the psalm that the Devil uses to tempt Jesus ("Jump from the temple and God will catch you."). Bible-quoters can never presume they get special treatment. They should wash their hands.

**4. Creation still goes on.** The spring flowers returned without any help from us. The city smog evaporates as we drive less and the planet heals its own atmosphere. God created the world to flourish. It will if we don't get in the way. And the earth will continue, with us or without us.

**5. Yes, we really can take a Sabbath.** God ordained rest, one day out of seven. Life does not gain its value from productivity, but from resting in the grace of God. Time to breathe and be replenished is good for us.

**6. Truth is more important than optimism.** Any rush to return to "normal" will be short-sighted, if only because the pandemic is re-arranging our lives. The only experts on illnesses are those who study them, with evidence, testing, and objective data. They are worthy of our deep respect. Thank God for their good work.

**7. "You will always have the poor with you."** (Mark 14:7) To no one's surprise, the vulnerable and the disenfranchised are catching the virus and dying at a much higher rate than the privileged. We have the ability to rebuild our society in ways that affirm the value of every life. Will we have the moral courage to do so?

**8. Discipline is difficult, but it saves lives.** No further comment.

**9. The mind is meant to be nurtured and the heart is given to be enlarged.** The people who are getting through this pandemic are reading books, discussing great thoughts, and enjoying the arts. They are developing new ways to show love and be connected. They refuse to be isolated even if they stay home.

**10. "God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble.** Therefore we will not fear, though the earth should change, though the mountains shake in the heart of the sea, though its waters roar and foam, though the mountains tremble with its tumult... God will help when the morning dawns." (Psalm 46:1-3, 5)
