Calling for a "Blue-Out" on Sunday, March 6th

Show Your Support for Presbyterian Disaster Assistance

Sunday, March 6th, PDA is not only welcome, but encouraged!

Our Lenten season will be filled with blue. Of course, our March arts series concert will feature blues music from The Merchants of Groove, but between Ash Wednesday and Easter we will be collecting for the Presbyterian Church USA's "One Great Hour of Sharing" special offering. Each gift supports the *Pres*byterian Hunger Program, the Presbyterian Committee on the Self-Development of People, and Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (PDA!). While we might never experience disaster, hunger, or oppression, millions of people in our country and around the world do lack access to sustainable food sources, clean water, sanitation, education, and opportunity. The PDA website lists no less than 42 crises to which it is currently responding, both here and abroad. OGHS is the single, largest way that Presbyterians come together every year to work for a better world, and Mission & Justice Committee has set a goal of \$5000 for our congregation.

The first Sunday in Lent every year is designated "Wear your blue t-shirt to church Sunday" as a specific testament and reference to PDA. While you might not have a blue t-shirt or think it warm enough for a t-shirt at start of March, we encourage you to don as much blue clothing as you can on March 6th to launch this year's offering and note it's importance in funding PDA across the coming year.

From the Pastor

As a teenager, I hosted a number of neighborhood "Hide and Seek" games. You'll remember how they go. One of the group shuts the eyes and counts loudly to one hundred, as the others scatter and hide. The counter becomes the seeker, looking in trees and behind bushes. When someone is found, they are chased and tagged. When all are found, another begins to count while the others hide.

The game continues until everybody is found or a significant number of the gang is weary of hiding. Sound familiar?

There's a hide-and-seek nature to our pandemic. Some are calling out, "All-ee, all-ee, in free," and acting as if the long night of hiding is over. The local supermarket recently relaxed its safety requirements and made masks optional. Predictably, few masks were seen.

By contrast, I remember the dark night of hide and seek when my sister and I were hiding behind a garden shed. We had kept out of sight so successfully that we wondered if we would ever be found. After a long, interminable wait, my sister whispered, "Do you think it's safe to come out now?"

That's a good question for you and me. After two long years, the covid-19 numbers seem to be dropping - but we've been there before. Another variation of the virus could pop up at any time. But is it safe to come out?

I hope so. There are increasing hints of safety. And I believe the day is coming when covid-19 will recede far enough into the shadows that it won't be a widespread threat. It will be safe to return and reconnect.

I am immensely proud that our church leaders have managed this health crisis with the utmost caution and care. To our knowledge, no one has caught or spread the virus within our church building, which is the best for which we can hope. And we will continue to take the utmost precaution to protect you and everybody else as we gather. For now, we will continue wearing masks when we are together in church. The coast is not quite clear.

But it will be. We know that. And when you feel that it's safe to return and join your fellow church members in the sanctuary, fellowship hall, or the church classroom, we will love to see you.

I look forward to the next time we can be together. All of us.

The Shape of Repentance: How Does It Look When We Return to God?

March 2 - The Inner Work of Returning (Bible study of Joel 2:12-17)

The prophet calls us to "rip open our hearts," presumably because they have hardened. What could this metaphor mean? What will it require of us? Why is change so difficult?


