The majesty of God's creation

Earth Day offers a reminder to be wise stewards of God's creation. Former U.S. Senate chaplain Lloyd Ogilvie wrote about how the universe reveals the greatness of its Maker.

"If we were to drive a car day and night at top speed without stopping," he writes, "it would take us nine years to reach the moon, 300 years to reach the sun, 8,300 years to reach the planet Neptune, 75 million years to reach Alpha Centauri, and 700 million years to reach the Pole Star.

"This is the reason the Psalmist, even with his limited cosmology, could say, 'When I consider the work of Thy fingers, the moon and the stars which Thou hast ordained; what is man, that Thou dost take thought of him? And the son of man, that Thou dost care for him? Yet Thou hast made him a little lower than God, and dost crown him with glory and majesty!' (Psalm 8:3-5)." Astonishing indeed!

Dear Friends -

Now that the masks are coming off and the fearsome pandemic seems to be subsiding, what has happened to the church? Here are some of my observations:

We have learned a lot of things:

- We are more resilient than we realized. The shock and awe of an unseen virus has traumatized all of us, some abruptly, others slowly. It has been a hard two years. I don't know about you, but my tendency is to "push through" when life gets difficult even if the difficulty numbs me. And we have pushed through. Mostly.
- We truly can count on one another. For those who have friendships within the church, they have experienced these friendships as life-giving and sustaining. For those who were brave enough to ask for help, they have made new friends. For those who preferred to hunker down and get through this season on their own, they report on the quiet support that they have felt.
- As much as we grumble about it, technology has been a primary way to keep our congregation nurtured and connected. I am regularly surprised and pleased at how many folks tune into our weekly worship service or read our weekly e-mail notes. They are grateful for the gifts of our staff. They are generous in keeping our congregation well-funded.
- We are a spiritual asset to our community. The Church on the Hill is a Light to the Neighborhood. Whether it's our arts outreach through concerts and broadcasts, our hybrid studies that pick up viewers as time goes on, or our hands-on projects to serve those in need, the community knows we are here. They appreciate what we offer. They admire our perseverance.

Other things have happened, too:

- We have gotten slower. It's as if we stepped into a time machine with a fast-forward button. We are moving more deliberately. There is some wisdom in this. Slow and steady wins the race.
- **Downward trends have accelerated**, revealing that some of our hunches about how things were headed have become inevitable truths. If a church program was limping, it has ceased. If a group was diminishing, it won't come back in its present form, if at all. Conversely, if the group or program was holding its own, it's probably doing fine. And all of this is OK.
- We have simplified our priorities and let go of what we deemed unnecessary. This has been particularly true for anybody who was due to make a job change, a move toward retirement, or a simple decision to engage in better self-care. And it seems to have happened in our congregation as a whole.
- To the positive column, **we have gotten much clearer about our values**. It is good to hear God speak through scripture. It is good to draw upon the resources of our faith. It is good to serve others. It is good to make a positive difference through our personal generosity. And it is <u>really</u> good to be together.

So where do we go from here? Clearly, we will do better if we build on our strengths, rather than fuss over our deficits. Saint Paul may have claimed to be "all things to all people," but that is not our church's calling. In the shaking down that we've experienced during the pandemic, I perceive a renewed consensus about what it means for us to be a worshiping, learning, and serving fellowship of faith.

In coming months, we will have leadership conversations about the emerging shape of our church program, especially as we look toward the fall. This can be an exciting and vital time for us to hit the reset button, particularly if we do it with our eyes open and our hearts alert.

As these conversations progress, let me suggest One Big Thing that all of us can do: **reach out to one another**. Expand the circles of our friendship. Share some meals together, now that it's safer to do that. Phone a stranger and introduce yourself. Ask simply, "How are you doing?" and listen deeply to the response. The health of our congregation will always be reflected in the strength of our relationships. I believe this.

Mission and Justice

The **Pentecost Offering**, the second of the PCUSA's four annual Special Offerings, is collected each year from between Easter and Pentecost Sunday (June 5th). Falling in the long shadow cast by Lent's One Great Hour of Sharing, this offering can be easily overlooked but like all our special offerings, it targets its own unique and important support need. All giving is directed specifically to **children and youth**, making it an investment in our greatest resource. And 40% of the giving is retained by individual congregations to make an impact in our own community, with the remaining 60% used to support children-at-risk, youth, and young adults through ministries of the Presbyterian Mission Agency.



For 2022 the Mission and Justice Committee has selected the **NEPA Youth Shelter** to be the recipient of this local share. A 501c3 nonprofit, they offer a rapid rehousing program for teens age 18-21 who find themselves homeless, and operate, as well, an after school drop-in center (at Olive and Wyoming) where at-risk youth can find food, drinks, computers, printers, a library, and other essentials like clothing, bathrooms, educational support, counseling, family reunification, and/or preparation for independent living. With a focus on social justice and advocacy, the Shelter welcomes youth from all backgrounds and is especially affirming to lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, and queer (LGBTQ+) youth, as this population constitutes a high percentage of homeless youth in our area. The organization employs an executive director, a life-skills coach, and a technical specialist.

We encourage you to visit their website at www.nepayouthshelter.org to learn more about their good work, and to plan to stay after worship on **Sunday, May 22nd**, when the Shelter's executive Director, Maureen Maher-Gray, will join us for a table-talk during coffee hour.

Dalton Food Pantry

The Dalton Food Pantry is located at the Dalton United Methodist Church at 125 S. Turnpike Road in Dalton, PA. The Food Pantry is open on Monday evenings from 6-7:30 p.m. We serve families, in need, in the Abington Heights School District and the Lackawanna Trail School District. The Food Pantry first opened its doors in June 1983 for this very important ministry.

To register you will need to provide the following information:

- 1) You will need to have a picture ID (current PA issued Drivers License) with your current address on it, for every person in your household 18 years or older.
- 2) For all children that live with you full time that are under the age of 18, you need to present an ACCESS Card or other form of insurance card.
- 3) You will also be required to show a current utility bill with your current street address on it. (No P.O. Box Numbers.)
