

From the Pastor December 2022

Christmas is upon us! At our home, the lights are up, inside and out. The gifts are ordered, and the Big Brown Truck is regularly putting them on the front porch. Schedules are negotiated and family gatherings are scheduled. Church services are planned. It looks like another Big Christmas.



Yet can I tell you this? I've never had a Christmas that has been totally satisfying.

As a child, I wrote out my Wish List in green crayon. Once in my memory, I delivered it to the Fat Guy at the department store with effervescent hope, only slightly discouraged that he didn't know my name. Then I waited. And waited. When the day arrived, most of what I listed was under the Christmas tree, thanks in no small part to those who overheard me making my list and repeating it to Santa. Most Christmas mornings, I was ecstatic at dawn and sullen in the afternoon.

Now that I've reached the age where "a pair of magenta socks" is the only item on my Wish List, I've begun to ponder why.

Perhaps I had discovered the recurring truth that more stuff doesn't make us happy. Or that new toys break quickly, especially if they are made of plastic. Or that there's an enormous amount of hype for the holiday, often fueled by the merchandisers. No single day can live up to its overinflated advertising. The thing that we saw in the catalog (remember catalogs?) is always smaller than it looked.

Probing deeper, the college philosophy class introduced me to Socrates, who proclaimed wisely that we are "leaky vessels." The soul with unrestrained desires will always require more and more, and never be complete. Fill us up, something spills out the broken seam. So, Socrates advised, "Expect less. Scale back your hopes." Helpful advice, but unsatisfying.

As age advances and the house has cleared out, I've put a lot more stock in relationships. There are people I love and wish to spend time with. I gain great delight in plotting experiences that will enrich them, even if visits are always shorter than I want and family traditions undergo constant revision.

And when I've gone to church, I've discovered the real reason for my discontent. Here it is: what I most want, what I most desire, is greater than what I'm able to receive. The Bible refers to it as "the glory of the Lord." It's a heavy presence. A full shot of it would be more than I could handle, like Moses being told he could not view the face of the Lord. He had to be content with glimpsing the Holy One walking away from him.

For all its fulfillment, Christmas continues as a promise. The Christ who is born is someone I have gotten to know, but we have yet to meet face to face. I've heard all the stories, and preached many, but I hunger for what lies behind them — and what lies ahead. And that's what returns me to church, every Christmas and every week. I want to catch another glimpse of Glory. I want to taste Grace. I need to have his Light rekindled in my soul. And I need to be surrounded by people like you, who are on the same journey.

For Christmas, I wish you Christ. I'll be right there beside you, wishing for Christ as well. See you in church.

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During the recent Stewardship Campaign, the Finance Committee and the Session have asked all members to increase their pledge amount by **at least 10%.** This request came because our pledges have remained at a flat rate while our expenses have continued to rise. We have also asked that you consider making a separate contribution to help rebuild our savings and investment funds. Because we spend more than we bring in, we have had to rely on these funds to balance the budget. Last year, the approved budget included the transfer of approximately \$60,000 from savings and our New Covenant investment fund. In a year where investments performed poorly and our investments lost value, this became a very hard hit for our church finances.

If we want to keep having what we have and doing what we do as a congregation, we need to increase income (10%+ bump in pledges) and rebuild our investment accounts (\$250,000 over 3 years). We can choose not to change anything, in which case we will use all of our savings in about 3.5 - 4 years. At that point, the cuts will be drastic to be able to simply pay our bills.

Of course, we can alternatively cut the budget at this time to match our income. However, there are only so many expenses that are in our control - such as staff, music, and outreach. What would you cut first? The choir? Christian Education? Our mission work? We are blessed to have what we have and do what we do, but it all comes at a price.

Please consider your pledges and contributions carefully and prayerfully as we prepare the budget for the work and worship of the First Presbyterian Church of Clarks Summit in 2023.







We'll also have cards you can fill out and give to someone letting them know you made a gift to a stranger in their honor or on their behalf.

Heifer International (www.heifer.org). Browse or borrow a catalog or explore online how you can help Heifer provide animals to participating families to end hunger and poverty and care for the Earth. Gifts can also be directed to Women's Empowerment and Earth Care. Order from their website or use the form in their catalog.

Presbyterian Giving Catalog (https://presbyteriangifts.pcusa.org). Browse or borrow a catalog, or explore online how you can give aid kits, livestock, agricultural supplies, water, education, or health care to needy families or individuals. Order from their website or use the form in their catalog.

Reaching the Pygmies Ministry. Established in 1994 to aid Batwa Pygmies who were evicted from their traditional rainforest home, you can purchase necessities (see the display cards) for distribution at their annual Christmas celebration.

Appalachia Service Project (https://asphome.org). Established in 1969, the Appalachia Service Project emphasizes mission trips for youth and adult volunteers to repair substandard housing in the central Appalachia region. You can support them through the purchase of candy (sign the list) or with a donation. Checks should be made payable to Appalachia Service Project and delivered to the church. There is no online donation option.

New Refugee Families in Lackawanna County. Fleeing political turmoil in their home countries, three families have recently resettled in our community. Each is starting a new life here and needs to set up a home and secure clothing for our colder winter. Check the Angel Tree for tags detailing specific needs; shop for the item(s) and bring them back wrapped and with the tag attached by December 18th. Checks should be made payable to First Presbyterian Church with "Refugee Gifts" in the memo line.

Afghan Refugee Status update

As mentioned previously, our new neighbors from Afghanistan are running out of time. If they came in that mess we saw on TV last year, they have parole status. Which means, they have one year from when they arrived here to file to get another status to allow them to stay longer. That has expired. Our local immigration resettlement office which used to accommodate this was shut down. It is not a simple process. People here in our area are finding themselves in a very desperate situation. If they are to be flown back, the Taliban will be waiting for them on the runway.



One thing we can all do to help is reach out to our representatives and ask them to hurry up and pass the Afghan Adjustment Act. It was introduced on August 15, is being negotiated and has not yet been brought
