# Refugee Case Example from Mission and Justice

To help bring to life our work with refugee families, we thought we would feature one family and the help we have provided.

An Afghan mother fled Kabul in August 2021 during the political upheaval that returned the Taliban to power. She then arrived in the United States and settled in Scranton with two of her children. Her husband and other children fled to other

countries. She has been working at a site two miles away from her home, without a car, requiring her two children and herself to walk two miles at night and in inclement weather from work to their home. In addition, this woman has only temporary immigration status and in order to stay in the United States and eventually bring the rest of her family here, she needs to apply and obtain a permanent resident visa. This application procedure is daunting for someone who does not yet speak English.

The ways that our church have helped this woman thus far include the following: The deacons provided this woman and her children the needed funds to pay for both the \$626 security deposit to move into safer apartments with Afghan neighbors that can lend support including childcare, and \$500 for the moving costs to these apartments. The Mission and Justice Committee provided funds to help pay for the workbooks being used for the English as a Second Language services offered at the Scranton Library where this woman and her children meet to learn English. In addition, the Mission and Justice Committee provided funding for the translation services offered this woman as she navigates her application request for a more permanent VISA.

These funds from our committee budgets come from your generous offerings from week to week.

## From the Pastor

### February 2023

I am ready for a snow day. How about you? It's been a while since we've had one. The weather has been mild, to say the least. These days, it seems like Pennsylvania has mixed up its meteorology with Australia.

There's nothing I like better than to call in and say, "Wish I could make it to the office, but they haven't plowed my street." A fire will be built in the fireplace, a pot of soup will bubble on the stove, and I will lean back in my chair with a good book. I love to have a day like that — a day to be still, a day to ponder, a day to sit by the roaring fire and reflect.



If it's a serious snow day, sometime in the afternoon I will blow the dust off the DVD player and insert the disc of my all-time favorite snow day film. The 1994 movie, "Nobody's Fool," has been a continuing favorite. It was Jessica Tandy's final film and features Paul Newman as a cranky loner who rediscovers his son.

For those who haven't seen it, it's a slow-moving film. The ensemble cast gives a great depiction of small-town life. The town has plenty of well-seasoned characters who rely on one another. Living in subsistence circumstances in upstate New York, they gather at the local watering hole to bet on Judge Wapner's verdicts, contend with one another's estranged relationships, and live with a realistic assessment of one another's strengths and weaknesses. I love the truthfulness of the film.

The townspeople in the movie form a curious parish, and they remind me how important it is to get to know folks over a long time. There are nuances in their relationships and depths to their personalities. They fail and succeed in ways not immediately obvious. When true change occurs in their lives, it is a very subtle sign of the Spirit's activity. And we will miss it if we're in a hurry.

I recommended the movie to a fast-paced friend who later reported, "It was like watching paint dry." Perhaps. But what kind of wisdom comes quickly? True knowledge does not come from quick consumption. Honest insight runs counter to the impulse to use other people for our own purposes. We must lean forward if we are to perceive the truth of what's going on with the people around us. And perhaps we will see what divine forces are at work in our everyday lives.

So I'll take a snow day when it comes. For most of us, life is a marathon, not a sprint. Even if our suburban neighbors push to get down the road as quickly as they can, I'll choose the slow path – in order to notice more.

#### Notes from our Finance Chairperson

As we enter the new year, the Session and Finance Committee would like to thank you for your generosity and continuing support for the work of our church. Each year, our budget includes the payment of per capita apportionment, a fee that each church is charged for each member in the congregation. Our payment for this year is ~\$22,000, or \$42 per member. Last year, we only received \$2,614 toward our per capita payment,




and the church had to pay the remainder (\$15,936). Please make sure that you are using the Per Capita envelope in your box of envelopes or paying this online separately from your standard donation. As an example, if you are a family of 4 and your children have been confirmed, the assessment for your family is \$168.

The Session is working hard to ensure that any members who are not active are removed from the rolls. This will reduce our per capita assessment that the church must pay. An active member is one who attends church and helps to support the church financially. If you know of anyone who would like to be removed from the church membership rolls, please contact Beverly Bright or JoAnn Hall.

You will notice that the red folders are back in the pews! This allows the Session to better assess how many active members we have and should be filled out by both members and visitors each time we attend worship.

#### Mission and Justice

It is with such great gratitude that we say "Thank You" to our congregation for your amazing generosity shown throughout the year, and in particular, throughout Advent with the Gift to a Stranger Event.



The above photo pictures the 4 laundry baskets brimming with 65 gifts for four immigrant families. Close to 40 individuals bought and wrapped these gifts, that were then hand delivered in these baskets to United Neighborhood whose staff planned on delivering them to the families a few days before Christmas.

Secondly, the Batwa pygmies in Uganda have benefitted with new mattresses, cups, plates, saucepans, soap, hoes, clothes, corn and one pig, thanks to your individual purchases, all amounting to \$800. Thirdly, four families contributed to the Appalachia Service Project through their chocolate purchases.

Additionally, many of us sent individual contributions to the Presbyterian Gift Catalogue and the Heifer Project. Finally, \$787 was raised for the Christmas Joy Offering, to benefit retired and active church workers and families along with support for the education of women and people of color.

It truly takes a village and we are most grateful!

# Our Next Hickory Street Community Lunch and Grocery Distribution...March 25th



According to Feeding America, the nation's largest hunger relief organization, 1.3 million Pennsylvanians are presently facing hunger, and about 25% of those are children.

We will continue our support of Hickory Street Presbyterian's free monthly community lunch on Saturday, March 25th. The menu for that day remains TBA but watch for updates in our print media and a display with sign-up sheets in the narthex, as we will again need about a dozen volunteers to prepare the entrée and another dozen to prepare desserts, as well as people to serve the meal that day. But our biggest need will be to again have on hand 35 bags of groceries to distribute, and we already know what is needed there. Look for printed shopping lists in the narthex and/or bulletin and take them with you when you do your own grocery shopping to watch for good sale prices. Boxes will be placed in the narthex to collect the following for each bag:


7:00 p.m. **Adult Choir** rehearses each week in the sanctuary


