Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, February 14 with a worship service in the sanctuary at 7:00 p.m.






Join us after worship on **Sunday**, **LENT February 18** for a meal and intergenerational program.

From the Pastor

February 2024



Ecclesiastes is the strangest book in the Bible. When the Psalms invite us to "praise ye the Lord," Ecclesiastes declares, "It is an unhappy business that God has given human beings to be busy with" (1:13). If Deuteronomy invites us to work hard and live a faithful life, the writer of Ecclesiastes observes, "All our efforts are like reaching for a cloud of smoke." American Optimism suggests things are always getting better, but Ecclesiastes clears the throat to say it's the same old cycle of seasons. What comes around goes around.

Isn't it curious that such a document is included in our scripture? We do not hear much from Ecclesiastes in the cycles of Bible readings used in our churches. Oh, if we worship on a New Year's Day once every three years, we may hear the most memorable quote, "For everything there is a season" (3:1). And once on a summer day, we hear the book announce, "What do mortals get from all the toil and strain with which they toil under the sun? For all their days are full of pain, and their work is a vexation; even at night their minds do not rest. This also is vanity" (2:23). Hmm. Wouldn't you rather be picnicking at the lake?

The writer of Ecclesiastes calls himself "the Preacher." He sounds like Eeyore, the grumpy donkey from the Winnie the Pooh stories. This Preacher describes all the noble gestures of human life, then sticks a needle in the red balloon. For those of us in the northern hemisphere, Ecclesiastes is a February book, dreary and damp, demanding and depressing, overcast and foggy. Perhaps that's why I plan to preach and teach through the book during the season of Lent. Its honesty offers a counterweight to superficiality. It pursues Truth with a capital T.

Some might think I've selected it for Lenten sermons because I am aging rapidly. True enough. Ecclesiastes was composed by an older person of privilege who surveys the vain mistakes and empty ambitions that have been exposed through his long life. Presumptions are punctured. Arrogance is leveled. The table filled with our accumulations is swept off abruptly, leaving us to ask, "Who am I, really?" What is my life all about? What truly matters? These are important questions for the season of Lent, as well as for all the seasons of life's journey.

Years ago, the rabbi Harold Kushner wrote a follow up to his best seller, When Bad Things Happen to Good People. It was an exploration of Ecclesiastes, titled When All You've Ever Wanted Isn't Enough. To nobody's surprise, it did not sell as well. Few people want to do the hard work of self-reflection. They want to skate past life's deep issues. But we gain a heart full of wisdom if we wrestle with them. We take a more measured view of our importance. Our previously impenetrable souls are opened to God's grace. That is the point of it all. Remember the line in the hymn? "It's grace that taught my heart to fear - and grace my fears relieved."

So, let's gather in grace and pursue a substantial Lent. We are on this journey together.




