

From the Pastor

March 2024

"Go, tell his disciples and Peter that he is going ahead of you to Galilee; there you will see him, just as he told you." – Mark 16:7



Easter comes early this year, so it's best to get ready. As we prepare to hear the story of Christ's resurrection, we are told when we shall see him. According to Mark's account, after Easter comes, Jesus does not go up into heaven. He does not extract revenge on Pontius Pilate. He does not return to the Temple to straighten out the clergy. No, Christ goes to Galilee – ahead of the women, ahead of the disciples, ahead of the rest of us. The Easter promise is that we will see him when we go to the places where he continues his work. And where might that be?

A college student volunteers at a hotline for women who have been abused. Every Friday night, she answers the phone whenever it rings. "The fraternity party scene was lame," she said, "and this is a lot more important." Was she doing this for college credit or as a part-time job? "Oh no," she said, "I think Jesus wants me to help anybody who is in trouble. He says to all of us, 'Don't be afraid.'" That is what she said. She speaks of Jesus in the present tense.

Or there's that couple that works every Thursday night in their local food pantry. She said, "At first we did it because there was nothing on TV and someone from the church's mission committee asked us to fill in." Her husband adds, "We started talking with the people at the pantry. They are hungry for something more than food. They feel alone and want human contact." So, they have kept going back. These days, they pay more attention to sermons than they ever did. They sense a connection between the living Word of Christ and human compassion.

Or there's that woman who answered a friend's invitation to volunteer for an agency. "I help senior citizens get the health care that they need," she said. "Some feel vulnerable, or afraid to stand up for what they need. I stand with them and together we find the answers." She paused and added, "I always zoned out as sermons about justice. Now I understand exactly why justice is so important."

Helping the abused, feeding the hungry, standing up for the vulnerable -- do you know where these people live? *Galilee*. Galilee, Pennsylvania. All of them are testifying in their words and deeds that love is stronger than death, that God is stronger than evil, and that the Risen Christ is ahead of us, inviting us to join in the life and work of God's new dominion.

This is Mark's profound invitation for Easter. What if resurrection happens, not just in the tomb, but in the places where Christ shows compassion and builds faith? What if the Risen Lord is ahead of us, beckoning us to join him in his work and share in his life? What if there are places we can go where life is stronger than death, where we can trust that this is the way of the kingdom?

The address: Galilee. Can we go together?

Call for Volunteers and Giving: Our Next Hickory Street Meal



We will take our next turn helping Hickory Street Presbyterian Church with their community meals program on Saturday, March 23. We will again be seeking volunteers to prepare the entrée (still TBA), to make or purchase an easy to serve dessert (your choice), and to help serve the meal that day. Sign-Up sheets and additional info will soon be found in the narthex. The program continues to serve 175+ meals each time they are offered. We are also collecting bags of groceries to give away that day and history tells us we will need at least 35 of these, each containing the following items:

1 box of breakfast cereal

1 box of pasta

1 can or plastic jar of spaghetti sauce

1 box of Mac n Cheese

2 cans of vegetables,

1 can of fruit.

1 can of tuna

1 four-pack of pudding or jello cups,

1 box of Pop Tarts

1 plastic jar of peanut butter

1 plastic jar of jelly

1 bag of candy

You can shop for the complete list (printed shopping lists will also be found in the narthex) or just selected items and bring them to the narthex.

Due to some conflicts, some of our regular meal-day help will not be there to assist this time around, so if you've never worked with us on the meal day, this would be a great time to give that a try. It is a real blessing and excellent reminder that even here in NEPA, hunger is a real and ever -present problem for many of our neighbors.

"A few years ago, I had the good fortune to be part of an Immerse group reading the Bible. There were eight of us, all bright, loquacious, and interesting. Those happy memories came flooding back as I took my first step in trying to organize First Presby's library in Room 206, the Session Room.

As you enter the room, the library greets you on the right, and the first section you'll see has to do with the Bible. I was overwhelmed by the number of Bibles and books about the Bible like <u>The Reader's Digest Bible</u>, <u>Reader's Digest Family Guide to the Bible</u>, <u>All the Plants of the Bible</u>, <u>Nelson's Complete Book of Bible Maps and Charts</u>. I was overwhelmed since I won't live long enough to read them all.

I need to confess up front that my favorite version of the Bible is the King James because of its unavoidable rhythms of good English. Geoffrey Chaucer and William Shakespeare elevated the English language leading to the eloquence of John Milton. Unfortunately, in our fast paced world where screens and phone dominate, emojies replace vocabulary. Though I accept the reality of this, I am grateful for books of all sorts and the thoughtful eloquent sermons of Bill Carter."

Marywood Music Showcase **Sunday, March 3**, 2024 4:00 p.m. Faculty from Marywood University






Rick Hoffenberg, Co-Chair of the Department of Music, Theatre, and Dance at Marywood University, has organized a **Marywood Music Showcase** to be held on **Sunday, March 3 at 4 p.m**. Members of the music faculty at Marywood University will present an afternoon recital of music by Piazzolla, Faure, Schubert, with some extraordinary surprises! Featured musicians will include Samantha Guevrekian, soprano, Elise Bond, clarinet, Diogo Carvalho, guitar, and Rick Hoffenberg, piano.

Dr Hoffenberg is currently Associate Professor and Director of Choral Activities at Marywood. He is also Music Director of the Wyoming Seminary Civic Orchestra, based

in Kingston, PA. As a pianist, he has performed at Orchestra Hall in Chicago; the Music Institute of Chicago; Rockefeller Chapel in New York City; and Richardson Auditorium, Taplin Auditorium, and Bristol Chapel, all in Princeton, New Jersey. He was the state winner, division winner, and national finalist in the 1994 MTNA Wurlitzer Piano Competition. He holds degrees from Princeton University, Yale University, and Westminster Choir College.


In March we will hear stories about Jesus' last week (including the Last Supper and His


Wednesday Evening Opportunities


