## From the Pastor

June 2025

Summer is nearly here. Soon it will be time to kick back with a root beer and enjoy a good book. I've been building a stack of summer books, and I thought I'd share what is on my list.

**Abundance** is a hot new book by Ezra Klein and Derek Thompson. They draw on their writings for the *Atlantic Monthly* to explore the inequities of employment, affordable housing, and access to power. Described as a "myth busting" work, the authors suggest constructive ways for our society to move forward.

Thomas Cahill wrote **How the Irish Saved Civilization** many years ago. With a congregational pilgrimage schedule to Ireland next year, will be timely to delve into Cahill's study of the demise of the Roman Empire – and learn how the Irish monasteries preserved texts and wisdom when everything else was falling apart.

How the South Won the Civil War is a brilliant work by historian Heather Cox Richardson. She traces how our nation has always lived with an internal battle between oligarchy and democracy. We have never quite settled that dispute. It continues to be reflected in our politics.

Wrestling with Rest was recommended by Taylor Silvestri, who is now studying at Princeton Theological Seminary. Nate Stucky is the author, a Mennonite, who writes, "Busyness is a sickness of the soul." Sounds like a perfect read for my Adirondack chair!

Andy Borowitz asks, "Are Ivy-educated politicians really as stupid as they act in public?" Good question, which he addresses in **Profiles in Ignorance.** There's every reason to expect the same satirical wisdom that Borowitz has provided for years. These days we need a good laugh.

Peter Enns, biblical theologian at Eastern University, has written a recent commentary on the book of **Ecclesiastes**. I like Pete's writings and believe he might offer deep insight into the crankiest book of the Bible. Pete has the perfect temperament for that.

Byron Borger, bookseller and buddy, describes Van Gogh Has a Broken Heart: What Art Teaches Us About the Wonder and Struggle of Being Alive, as one of the most important books he has ever read – and he reads hundreds of books each year. Russ Ramsey has integrated stories of renowned artists with insights about what it means to be alive.

Revenge of the Tipping Point: Overstories, Superspreaders, and the Rise of Social Engineering is the latest book by Malcolm Gladwell. I've been listening to his Revisionist History podcast for years and always learn something by taking a second look at settled truths and assumptions.

**Zero to the Bone: Fifty Entries Against Despair** was a Christmas gift from my friend Jim. Both of us enjoy poet Christian Wiman, and I'm anticipating the fifty entries will provide my daily devotions for the summer.

What are you reading? I'm curious to find out and always looking for recommendations. We are commanded to love God with our minds. A good book can nurture that love!



## **HELP NEEDED: Coordinator for our Highway Cleanups**

Our Earth Care Program is seeking a new coordinator for our Highway Cleanup Project. We pick up the litter on a stretch of the Morgan Highway between Country Club and Winola Road 3-4 times each year on Saturday mornings. We have a good corps of volunteers but need someone to organize them. The work includes:

- Going to the PennDOT website to schedule the cleanup dates and request supplies and safety signs
- \* Emailing the volunteer list to announce the cleanup dates and advertising them in the church bulletins, newsletters, and *Light from the Hill*
- Going to the PennDOT facility (Morgan Highway and Grove Street) the day before to pick up the supplies (trash bags, safety vests, gloves) and safety signs
- Putting up the "Litter Crew Ahead" signs (at the Country Club and Winola intersections) on the morning of the cleanups, then taking them down and returning them (outdoor drop-off) to the PennDOT facility afterward
- Meeting the volunteers on the morning of the cleanup in the parking lot of Clarks Summit Methodist (Morgan Highway and Grove Street) to distribute the supplies
- Going to the PennDOT website afterward to report the results of the cleanup

The second Thursday of each month is Food Pantry Day. (Work is from 9-11am and 4-6pm)

Thanks to 8-10 reliable morning volunteers, food (both perishable and non-perishable, and some pretty heavy cases!) is unloaded from the Weinberg truck, organized, and, in assembly line fashion, is packed into individual family units. The afternoon crew of 4-6 volunteers delivers the food to the recipients' cars and completes necessary paperwork.

Things have been going well under the leadership of Jack and Diane Scheuer, Patti McGonagle and Jamie Strong. Jack and Diane handle logistics and communication with Weinberg Food Bank, Patti (who is experienced in food pantry operations) is now our data entry expert, and Jamie registers and communicates with clients.

But we need help with a few things:

- 1. **Most important**, we don't want to keep the FPC food pantry a secret! Please help us spread the word to families who would benefit from this monthly nutrition. - 2. On occasion, when a family is unable to pick up food, we need to deliver these leftovers to a social service agency in South Scranton the next morning (Friday). If you can take this food to Scranton, it can be put to good use.
- 3. And we are happy to welcome volunteers to join us on second Thursdays....to carry, to pack, just to see how it all works. It takes no more than an hour and is time well spent!
